Devotional Meditation Elder, Monica Stevens April 7, 2022

Ever-present Grace Psalm 23:6

"Yes, goodness and faithful love will pursue me all the days of my life, and I will live in the Lord's house as long as I live." (CEB)

Believe it or not, this meditation took root (pun intended) as I observed trees on the way to and from Charlottesville this past week. Laura and I had to go to Charlottesville because she had a routine check-up with one of her doctors. Sometimes the drive is difficult due to a very early departure time, bad weather, or difficulties that Laura is having, but this week, the drive was very pleasant. Even the traffic volume seemed lighter than usual.

Since we make this trip every month or so, we get to witness the cycle of the seasons in the changes of the foliage along the way. For most of the year the larger trees garner the most attention. In the summer, the lush green foliage of the hardwood trees and the pines obscure much of what lies beyond the road while at the same time providing some shade on the road from the glare of the strong summer sun. In the fall, the larger trees once again take center stage as their leaves turn shades of red, gold, and brown creating a vibrant patchwork guilt of color and texture. During the winter, when most of the leaves have fallen from the deciduous trees, the evergreen trees serve as hardy reminders that even though the other trees look dead and the fields are bare, abundant life still exists even in the harshness of winter. On our trip last week though, the large trees were either still dormant or just barley sprouting tiny yellow-green leaves. Spring is the season for the smaller, under-story trees to announce their presence. Unlike the brazen colors of the fall, these trees shyly blossom forth resplendent in shades of white, pink, and purple while the brilliant yellows of the daffodils and forsythias seem to cheer them on. Like the returning robins, redbud, dogwood, and other flowering trees announce the new life that comes with the spring.

While musing on the changing seasons, several random thoughts occurred to me. The first was that regardless of the appearance and characteristics of a given season, each and all seasons are full of life. This observation reminded me that no matter what sort of "season" of life we are currently inhabiting, we are still surrounded by and infused with the life that God has given to us. Even in the

times that feel gray and fallow, God is still there with us, supplying us with his lifegiving love.

Another thought I had was that all of the trees along the road have a function and a purpose. It seems that the large trees get most of the attention, but all trees add their part to the creating a healthy environment that is so necessary to all species that live on this earth. If I compare myself to the trees, I don't see myself as one of the sturdy oaks or graceful willows whose presence is so commanding, but rather I see myself as one of the understory trees doing my small part in my small area of the world. Regardless of who we are, we all have a part to play in helping God's kingdom come to fruition here on earth as it is in heaven.

One last set of thoughts. When we think about the life of Jesus, we most often call to mind the great events mentioned in the Bible—his birth, baptism, calling the disciples, teaching, preaching, healing, feeding the five thousand, the Transfiguration, raising Lazarus, the triumphal entry into Jerusalem, the Last Supper, his crucifixion, death, and burial, and of course his Resurrection and Ascension. These are very important parts of Jesus' life, ministry, and significance that we should study and think about, but that is not all there was to Jesus' earthly life. While Jesus was always fully God, he was also always fully human and he lived a large portion of his life before and in between the events in the Bible. I am sure he did many of the things that we do such as enjoying good meals, informal get-togethers with family and friends, listening to music, going to worship, and taking care of the many things involved in daily living.

In all of these very human things, Jesus would have been faithful to his calling to live in God's way. Perhaps this is an important lesson we need to think about. All of us are called to be faithful in the way that we live our lives whether God calls us to great deeds or not. Being faithful to God in the everyday tasks of life is perhaps the most important witness we can share.

These are some of my thoughts from this week. Like the trees, regardless of our role in life, we are all important to the life of the rest of God's creation. Each of us is called to live our life in the light of God's love and grace regardless of the task we are assigned. Jesus has provided us the model for how to be faithful in taking part in great deeds and in the small deeds that make up our daily lives. May God continue to bless us and keep us in God's grace so that we may be a blessing to others. Amen.


