Devotional Meditation Elder, Monica Stevens February 9, 2022

Drawn Together Matthew 18:20

Last month I mentioned that I have been feeding the birds on my kitchen window ledge. This past Monday morning when it was so wet, cold, and icy I seemed to have more birds than usual. I noticed that at any given moment I could have from four to ten birds from several different species sharing the space and happily pecking away at the seeds and nut pieces on the window ledge. The birds all looked different, had their own personalities, and their preferred way of eating. The titmice, chickadees, blue jays, and nuthatches seemed to prefer to land, select a morsel, and fly off to eat it in the trees. Goldfinches, house finches, juncos, and doves all liked to land on the ledge and feed until they were full or startled into flying into the safety of the trees. The cardinals, sparrows, wrens, and downy woodpeckers could go either way. Occasionally, one of the birds would get a little cranky with another bird, but it only lasted a second or two and then they all resumed eating. If the window ledge reached capacity, the waiting birds would perch in a nearby tree until a spot opened up. Even when the larger birds such as doves and the red-bellied woodpecker came looking for seeds or nuts, the other birds would either move over to give them space or fly off to the tree and wait until there was more room.

As I watched, I became aware that I was seeing a living metaphor for part of God's vision for humanity. Left to their own devices in the wild, most of these birds would not be eating in such close proximity to the others. Each species would do their own thing to survive as best as they could. However, all of these birds were drawn together by the availability of food at the window compared to the scarcity of food in the wild. This is where I recognized a metaphor applicable to humanity. Left to our own devices, most people would remain in their family groups or in their well-travelled daily paths without giving much notice to what others were doing unless they had a good reason to do so. God offers us a reason and the means to interact with others who are different from those in our close social circle by feeding us on God's word and nurturing us through Jesus' presence in the Holy Spirit. God gives us himself to draw us together.

Unlike the very temporary avian unity produced by bird seed at my bird feeder, the unity that God offers through the sustenance he provides has lasting value and effect. God's Word and presence empowers people from our own church and people from very different cultures, ethnicities, viewpoints, races, and economic and social backgrounds to join together to take part in God's vision of one human family united through the love of Jesus Christ. The closer we draw to God through prayer, praise, worship, study, and service, the more we find we have in common with others who once seemed impossibly foreign to us. As we grow stronger and deeper in Christ's love we are able to see beauty where we once sensed only strangeness, and we can replace our fear with the joy and comfort of recognizing the kindred spirits of our siblings in God's family. When we choose to feed on a diet of God's love and care, our awareness of the differences that enrich us begins to increase. We begin to live out the words we say every Sunday when we pray, "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven."

Living into God's vision for humanity isn't always easy, but the good news is that Jesus has promised wherever "two or three gather in my name, I am there among them." May the grace of God, the love of Jesus, and the power of the Holy Spirit fill us and strengthen us each day as we commit ourselves to living and sharing God's vision of unity with all of God's people. Alleluia! Amen!

From the Transition Team

When Pastor Mark retired on August 31, our church began the process of finding a new pastor. A Transition Team, made up of Monica Stevens, Denny Casey, and Joan Montgomery, was appointed by the Session's Administration Committee. In an effort to keep the congregation informed we want to tell you the work that has been done and the work to be done.

- The Transition Team met with Carl Utley, our General Presbyter, on 9/16/21 for training.
- Responsibilities of the Transition Team are:
- 1. Identify and recommend to the Session a candidate for Interim Pastor;
- 2. Identify Transitional Priorities for Interim start up;
- 3. Consult staff and elders about needs from Interim Pastor;
- 4. Complete the Presbytery's Ministry Information Form (MIF) and seek appropriate approvals. The MIF describes our church in location, membership, mission statement, narrative questions, and top 10 Leadership Competencies, salary range, and basically what we are looking for in an Interim Pastor;
- 5. Work with the Interim during transition as requested by Interim; and
- 6. Communicate to congregation about transitional process.
- We were charged with interviewing staff and session members for what they wanted professionally and personally in an Interim Pastor. That has been completed.
- The Transition team met several times to consolidate the interview responses and to complete the MIF.
- The Ministry Information Form was approved by the Session at its November meeting and was approved by the Presbytery.
- Candidates were identified based on matching our needs with candidate applications.
- The Transition Team had its second training on interviewing candidates for the Interim Pastor position by the Presbytery in January.
- Thirty-eight matches were considered and the Transition Team watched sermons from the top 6 candidates.
- An email was sent to the six candidates to determine their interest in our church and to request an initial Zoom meeting as a first contact.
- The next steps involve Zoom interviews, vetting by the Presbytery office, and possible in-person interviews. From that we are hopeful the person God has chosen for us will be evident and his/her name can be brought to the Session for approval.

Although the process seems slow, even to us, we want the congregation to know that the process is moving forward.
