Devotional Meditation Elder Dr. Denny Casey November 7, 2021

"I will give thanks to you, Lord, with all my heart; I will tell of all your wonderful deeds." Psalm 9:1

As the calendar year winds down and we enter the season of thanksgiving, I've been thinking about the many things I am thankful for and the importance of expressing gratitude. This psalm came to mind.

We are living in a time when it seems far easier to criticize than praise, to complain than give thanks, and to count our losses rather than our blessings. Yet through Psalm and Scripture we are called to give thanks and praise to the Lord.

The apostle Paul declares, "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18). So, we are called to give thanks and not just when good things happen, but in all circumstances.

The Bible teaches us, God wants us to have a grateful heart, but how well have we learned that lesson? How often do we stop and find a way to express our gratitude?

When we acknowledge every good thing that happens in our life is the result of God's grace and mercy, we naturally become more thankful. God's grace is not something we can earn or deserve. It is God's gracious gift and in accepting that gift, we become more open to appreciate our blessings every day.

Gratitude changes us. There are many scientific studies about the power of gratitude. Gratitude is associated with greater happiness; improved overall health and emotional well-being; helping us deal with adversity, fear and anxiety; and building stronger interpersonal relationships. Gratitude can bring a greater sense of joy in our heart. With gratitude, we can become more aware of the goodness in our life. In the process, we tend to recognize that the source of that goodness lies at least partially outside ourselves. So, being grateful helps us connect to something larger than ourselves — whether to other people, nature, or a higher power.

Thanksgiving can be so much more than a once-a-year holiday - it can be a daily renewing and reviving spiritual practice...a lifestyle, a disciple's lifestyle.

So, what are you thankful for? Take the holidays and start each day with 2 to 3 minutes of just giving thanks and praise to God. Take time and be grateful, you'll be glad you did.

Let us pray:

Gracious God, Thank you for your amazing power and work in our lives. Thank you for your goodness and for your blessings. Thank you for bringing hope through even the toughest of times and for strengthening us for your purposes. Thank you that you are always with us and will never leave us. We give you praise and thanks, for You alone are worthy! In Jesus' name we pray, amen.

The Core of Stewardship is Love

"Stewardship isn't an event or campaign. It's a spiritual practice."

"Of course, stewarding financial resources is part of stewardship. But to practice Christian stewardship and be moved by it is to consider how we shepherd our whole lives – through word and habit, and with God and each other – to be expressions of gospel love in the world."

"Like all spiritual practices, including prayer or regular worship attendance, stewardship isn't a one-time event or even seasonal. It's an ongoing commitment with endless opportunity for growth and increased attunement to God's call. What's more, the practice is valuable outside of financial goals. If we quadruple our church bank accounts but aren't transformed into a community of people who are kinder, gentler, more ready to welcome the stranger, more forgiving and more committed to justice, then we may have practiced fundraising, but we didn't find ourselves playing in the deepest wells of real stewardship where real change lives. The thermometer for measuring meaningful stewardship is less the meeting of an annual financial goal and instead the degree to which a church body looks more and more like beloved community."

IMPLICITLY ACCEPTS PIZZA BOXES

Recycling guidelines in your area suggest that corrugated pizza boxes are accepted. Please empty your corrugated pizza box and recycle it as you would any other corrugated box. Empty corrugated pizza box acceptability in your area is implied since corrugated boxes are accepted and there's no mention of pizza boxes being prohibited.

SUGGESTION: To help clear the confusion, please contact your local recycling program and suggest they update the guideline to say, "Empty, corrugated pizza boxes are accepted, even if they have food residue on them. Please empty your corrugated pizza box and recycle it as you would any other corrugated box."
