Focus on Youth

Heading to Arkansas and Heifer Ranch

Heifer Ranch, a farm run by Heifer International near Perryville, Arkansas, is the destination of our youth educational mission trip this summer. Pastor Mark and two other adults will take five of our high school youth in the church van. Leaving Martinsville on June 20, they will stay at overnight at a church near Nashville, TN, halfway there. They will return on June 27.



Heifer International has been working to lift people out of poverty in countries around the world for over 70 years. Its development projects give people the training and resources they need to provide for themselves and their families and give to others in need around them.

The Global Village at Heifer Ranch has several authentic villages from countries where Heifer International has projects (i.e., African, Asian, Guatemalan, Appalachian, etc.) On arriving, the group will participate in Alternative Break, a five-night program which combines experiential learning with service activities. The service allows participants to give back while experiencing something for the first time, like milking a goat or harvesting vegetables. One of the experiential learning programs is Global



Gateway, which creates an existence in which nothing—shelter, food, water or cooking fuel—can be taken for granted. Participants prepare a meal with limited resources and spend a night in the Global Village (from Heifer International's website: www.heifer.org).

As of this writing, donations and proceeds from the auction have raised all the program expenses for the group. Still needed is money for gas and other travel expenses. God bless you, church! —Pastor Mark

The Request

Jesus stopped and ordered the man to be brought to him. When he came near, Jesus asked him, "What do you want me to do for you?" "Lord, I want to see," he replied." Luke 18:40-41

Most of you have heard me say, many times, to think of the Lord as our very best friend. So when we would share our deepest thoughts with our best friend we probably are not going to use a lot of stiff "King James" language in that conversation. A prayer should express first a grateful heart for blessings already received and then our requests on behalf of yourself and others. Our prayers should reflect our true thoughts and not what we think someone else wants to hear, because after all God is the intended recipient!

A while back I heard a story about a man who was taking his family out to eat. When the man's six-year-old son asked if he could say grace, the child was quickly given the honor. He began his prayer with familiar words, "God is great. God is good and let us thank him for our food." He then began to add some words, "I thank you for this food and would thank you more if we got ice cream for dessert. And liberty and justice for all! Amen!" While there was some laughter from customers nearby, one woman remarked, "That's what's wrong with kids in this country. They don't even know how to pray. Asking God for ice cream! Why I never!"

Hearing this, the man's son burst into tears and asked his father, "Did I do it wrong? Is God mad at me?" As his father held him and assured him that he had done a terrific job and God was certainly not mad at him, an old man who had observed the whole thing approached the table. He winked at the boy and said, "I happen to know that God thought that was a great prayer." "Really?" "Cross my heart." Then in a quiet whisper the old man added, "Too bad she never asks God for a little ice cream because sometimes ice cream can be good for the soul."



The man in the Luke 18 Scripture was a blind beggar who simply asked for what he desired. In his day, there were no ophthalmologists or Lasik eye surgeries. Without a miracle, his life would never change. So, in an act of desperation the beggar cried out, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" The crowd rebuked him, but Jesus stopped and took notice. A gentle request of a slight longing never really taps the power of God, but the passionate, intense desire of the very depths of our human hearts will never be ignored by God!

Our faith is too often so proper, and we let what others think of us determine our actions,

even our relationship with Jesus himself. Today, may we be more like the blind beggar and share our deepest desires with our best friend Jesus!

The children have been ably led by Laura Stevens, JoAnne Sanders, and Janet Fentress, plus a faithful group of volunteers who fix snacks, assist in the Bible study classroom and in the music sessions. A heartfelt "thank-you" goes to each one of these ladies who minister to our children. As Cynthia mentioned, we regret that

we have to say good-bye to Laura as music leader.

In order to keep the program going, new leaders are needed, especially music leaders. This is the only Christian Education program many of our children attend, so it's vitally important to our congregation. The children's enthusiasm as they learn Bible stories and their growth as worship leaders is evident to our volunteers. We also need more volunteers to commit to one Monday afternoon a month to help out with the snacks or assist the leaders.

A curriculum is available with lesson plans, music CDs and creative ideas to help anyone who is willing to undertake music instruction. While a trained musician would be wonderful, it is not necessary. Music Director Cynthia Dobrinski, is available to work with any music leaders. Our goal is to plan the music program year so that commitments might be in blocks of 8-10 weeks at a time, either with singing instruction or bells and chimes.
