## **From My Perspective Within The Kingdom**

In a recent sermon I shared the story of a thirteen-year-old boy named Robert Hill, who many years ago heard of the medical missionary work of Dr. Albert Schweitzer and decided to help by sending a bottle of aspirin to Schweitzer's hospital in Africa. Since Robert's father was in the Army, he asked the commander of the Air Force to deliver the bottle of aspirin in one of his planes. A radio commentator reported the incident on his program; word got around quickly. And, the end result was that Robert Hill flew into Africa with four tons of medical supplies! Dr. Albert Schweitzer, when he saw the boy, said, "I never knew a little child could do so much for my hospital!"

That story came to mind this past week as I read over a 2010 fact sheet about the work of Grace Network here in our Martinsville-Henry County community. In early 2005 the United Way of Martinsville and Henry County gave a grant to the Ministerial Association and, before too long, Grace Network was launched. Here's what the 2010 fact sheet reports: over sixty churches in our community support Grace Network and each church provides a certain food item per month (we contribute pasta and spaghetti sauce). This past year alone, congregations donated \$139,173.21 and 52,000 items of food and personal care products. Other sources of revenue came from grants, individuals, foundations and trusts, and business and civic groups – all of which totaled \$342,710.18. There were 56,688 food items distributed to 1,127 households equaling 2,304 individuals. The total amount of assistance provided to those in need was \$265,655.22 (70% for electric/water/sewer; 25% for rent/mortgage; 2% for heating oil; 1% natural gas; and 2% for other). Besides all of the above, Grace Network also provided 1,200+ Christmas meals for the homeless and needy; 233 bicycles, toys, school supplies and personal care items at Christmas; 12 after-school sites were served meals that enabled hundreds of family members to enjoy a meal and spend quality time together; Grace Network volunteers processed 97 tax returns; and so much more!

Like Robert Hill and his bottle of aspirin, which in turn grew to be four tons of medical supplies, Grace Network has grown since its beginning in 2005. It would be interesting to see an overall total for the years 2005-2010. I imagine the results would be staggering. I rejoice that so many needy people in our area are being helped with food items, personal care products, and many other forms of necessary assistance. Clients also receive counseling as to how to better manage their resources and make things stretch (such as using energy efficient light bulbs and blankets to help reduce energy usage). Besides the vast number of people who have been helped, I also think of the congregations, business and civic groups, and individuals, who are also helped by being able to give from their resources and pass on their blessings to those in need.

Isn't it simply amazing what God can do when individuals are brought together to address the needs in a given area? God calls us to be partners with God and with one another, and when we do so, all kinds of great things can and do happen. Ideas are formed and put into action. Then, both those who receive and those who give lift their voices in unison and give praise to God from whom all blessings flow. Thanks be to God!

### **Word from the Associate Pastor: *Ministry and Mission***

One of the first courses I took in seminary was called, “The Theology of Mission and Church,” and our professor challenged us to rethink our concept of mission. Oftentimes, the church thinks of mission in terms of tasks to be completed, projects or programs that help people in need, or financial support of missionaries overseas. Instead of centering our definition of mission on what we do, we should instead think about who we are, and to whom we belong. My professor would say, “God’s mission has a church, not the other way around.” God’s mission for the world is much bigger than any one church, or even all the churches can undertake. Author Andrew Kirk writes, “The mission of God flows directly from the nature of who God is. God’s intention for the world is that in every respect it should show forth the way God is – love, community, equality, diversity, mercy, compassion and justice.” Therefore, God’s mission is at the heart of everything we do. We participate in God’s holy purpose for us as we worship, as we teach, as we serve, as we build communities that reflect Christ’s love and grace. Participating in God’s mission is part of our joyful response to the love God extends to us.

One summer when I was in college, I served as a Global Intern with the PC(USA) with the Presbyterian Border Ministry between the PC(USA) and the Iglesia Presbiteriana de Mexico in Del Rio, Texas and Ciudad Acuña, Mexico. Mission trip groups from all over the United States traveled there to help build a church building for a new congregation being organized on the Mexican side of the border. As we welcomed the groups, we would reflect together on the purpose of their work. We often shared this quote with them, “Our first task in approaching another people, another culture, another religion is to take off our shoes, for the place we are ap-

proaching is holy; else we may find ourselves treading on someone’s dreams. More serious still, we may forget that God was there before our arrival” (attributed to Max Warren). For those mission groups, and for us, we must remember that mission is not about “bringing God” to people. It is about partnering to discover how God is already working in all of us, and exploring what God would have us do next – together. Participating in God’s mission is about building relationships, not simply about “helping out.”

We have wonderful opportunities in this congregation to participate in God’s mission – by attending trainings and volunteering at CAFV, by giving to Angel & Butterfly Trees and Christmas Share, by supporting our youth group as they travel on their Mission Trip to Charlotte. These are but a few ways that we can come together to give witness to God’s compassion and justice in our community and beyond. God’s mission for the world is ever unfolding, and we are always being called to respond to the Spirit’s call, following where God is leading next.

### **PANDAMANIA VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH JULY 11 - 15**



#### **More Panda facts:**

1. The basic fur color of the giant panda is white with black eye patches, ears, legs, feet, chest, and shoulders. Within its natural environment (the deep forest and, at upper elevations, snow and rock), its mottled coloring provides camouflage.
2. The fur of the giant panda is thick and coarse. It consists of a coarse outer layer and a very dense, wooly-like underfur. To the touch, the fur feels oily. This oily protective coating helps protect pandas from the cool and damp climate in which the bear lives.
3. There are thought to be less than 1,000 pandas in the wild. There are about 110 pandas in captivity, mainly in China. There are seven in the United States – Zoo Atlanta and The National Zoo each have a pair. The pair in San Diego also has a small cub. Others are in Mexico City, Japan, Spain, Germany, France and South Korea.
