From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

With Easter right around the corner, I am reminded of an illustration that my friend, Michael Jinks, used in one of his sermons. He wrote: “Our family went to see the movie, *Beethoven*, which is about a huge St. Bernard dog and his human family. The little boy in the family is about ten years old; he’s sort of small for his age; and he’s always getting beat up by the bullies.

“One day the bullies corner him; they pull off his glasses and start pushing him. The kid has just about all he can take, and so he puts up his fists to fight back. And at that very moment, the huge family dog, Beethoven, comes to his rescue. It walks up behind the little boy, glaring at the bullies, snarling.

“The bullies take one look at the dog and they decide it’s time to stop. Quickly without making any sudden movements, they give the little boy his glasses back, they apologize, and they back away. And all this time, the little guy standing there with his fists raised, doesn’t know that the dog is behind him. He thinks the bullies backed down because they were afraid of him.

(Michael then applies the story) “St. Paul is standing on the sidewalk surrounded by death. His fists are up. He dares the bully, Death, to do its worst. He isn’t afraid. But here’s the difference: Paul knows that he can stand on the sidewalk and face down death, because the Risen Christ is standing behind him!”

As I write this article for the April 2010 newsletter, we are still working our way through Lent. Why, Jesus hasn’t even made it to Jerusalem yet! Before long, there will be a cross with his name on it – just for him. And yet, we know how this story ends, don’t we? While we still have to get to Calvary, we go forth knowing full well that the cross will be transformed from a tragedy into a triumph, and the grave will be emptied and the Christ will be raised. Now there is forgiveness of our sins and new, abundant, and eternal life on both sides of the grave. What’s more, the Risen Christ stands by our side, staring down the enemies - sin and death - and they back down for they know they are no match for this One, who is the Resurrection and the Life.

We aren’t promised that life will always be good and fair. But, the Risen Christ does promise us saying, “I will be with you always.” Through thick and thin, he stands with us and for us. Whatever life throws at us, we have his presence and his power to see us through to a better place of being.

In preparing for my sermon on March 21, I came upon this thought by Linda J. Hillard, who wrote: “It’s hard to see a new thing happening as one learns she has cancer and begins to undergo chemotherapy. It’s hard to see a new thing happening as a man watches his business fall a part... Believing in the new thing God was doing in her life, the woman with cancer reprioritized her life, reconciling a severed relationship with her sister. Believing in the new thing God was doing in his life, the businessman sold all his business stores, except one. He moved his family to a smaller house, had more time to spend with his wife and children and had far less stress in his life.”

Those are examples of resurrection living. Where have you seen the Risen Christ actively involved in your life, and have you made sure to tell others? Thanks be to God who gives us the victory over sin and death through our risen Lord Jesus Christ!

On April 1, Maundy Thursday (when Jesus shared the Last Supper with his disciples in the upper room) we will have a covered dish supper at 5:30 in the fellowship hall, and everyone is encouraged to bring a favorite casserole or special dish, and a dessert to share with others. We will then move upstairs to the sanctuary for the worship service at 7:00 p.m. During worship we will celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper by intinction--people will come forward to the Table to sup by taking the bread and dipping it in the juice, and then they will return to their pews. If you prefer, you can either receive communion from the bread and juice trays on the front Table or an elder can serve you the communion elements in your pew.

Palm Sunday is March 28, the day when we celebrate Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. Our community holds an annual Palm Sunday in the park worship service, where a group of churches in the area walk to Wilson Park for a brief ecumenical worship service. We will meet in the narthex of the sanctuary at 9:30 a.m. that Sunday morning to walk as a group to the park. All Sunday school classes that day will be cancelled.



The Tempo "Our Musical Pulse" Chancel Choir

On Sunday morning, March 21, the Chancel Choir sang a beautiful service of choral music distributed throughout as items we usually associate with the spoken word. Even the Sermon was sung by a quartet of female singers, "Hear Our Prayer", a short cantata by Felix Mendelssohn.

Even though the last music service was only two and a half months back, the choir hit the road singing this new year. They worked very hard to put this music into performance shape. (A performance for God.) They did

an excellent job!

The choir was joined by some guests from out of town as well as some from Martinsville. Brian Joyce and Norman Duensing joined us and played Percussion and Bass on two of the anthems. Lynn Pritchett and Maggie Pilson played their flutes, one as the Prelude and one as the Postlude. By the way, the congregation remained seated during the Postlude, something we encourage for every service. We always appreciate the fine work of our Organist, Cynthia Dobrinski. She wrote the piece that she and Lynn played as the Prelude. The Chancel Choir has Maundy Thursday and Easter to go before the Summer Stretch gets here in June. They still rehearse on Wednesday evenings at 7:00 o'clock. We have room for other interested singers, both in the choir room and in the Chancel area of the Sanctuary.

If you appreciated the service on March 21, give a choir member an "at-a-boy" or a "thank you", the next time you see one.

Sanctuary Ringers

You will hear the Sanctuary Ringers in the morning service April 4, which is Easter this year. They will be playing the Prelude, joining the organ and congregation on the opening hymn, and playing the Offertory. The music they will play includes; "Now the Green Blade Riseth", "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today", and "Bell Song". When you see and hear our largest Handchimes on Easter, those were given in memory of Jack Lester. Thank you for those who gave the money to make this purchase possible.

Last month we welcomed Sarah Robertson into the ringers. Sarah is a Lutheran and plays with us because of her interest in Handbells and our Sanctuary Ringers. We welcome her. With this addition, we have a full choir, TWELVE! Praise God from whom all blessings flow!

The choir is enjoying being in a room we share with the Youth and Children's Bell Choirs. It is always special to have your own room, and we appreciate those who made it possible.

Please continue to be in prayer for the five young people, who are attending the 2010 **Confirmation Class** with Randy. They are: Stuart Beard, Annie B. Boyd, Dyer Pace, William Seamon, and Mary Catherine Stegall. The class will conclude on Sunday, April 25 with a review of all of the material covered during the past several months. Then, the youth will have dinner and meet with the Session on Monday, April 26; at that time they will have the opportunity to make their own profession of faith. 
KUHN SCHOLARSHIP AVAILABLE

For several years, John and Vera Jane Kuhn have faithfully provided a \$1,000 scholarship for the purpose of providing financial assistance to students seeking undergraduate education or vocational training. John and Vera Jane, residents of King's Grant, are active members of our church.

The scholarship is paid directly to the institution of higher learning that the recipient is attending. Funds are disbursed no later than July 1 of each year and the scholarship is applied to tuition costs for undergraduate education or vocational training. A recipient may reapply for the scholarship in subsequent years. Financial need of the applicant is given primary consideration.

The scholarship is administrated by a scholarship committee that reviews all applications. Applications for the scholarship are available now (in the Church Office) and the scholarship committee awards the scholarship by June 1 for the school year beginning in the fall of the same year. Applications are due by April 30.

We are very grateful to the Kuhns for their support and generosity!!
