

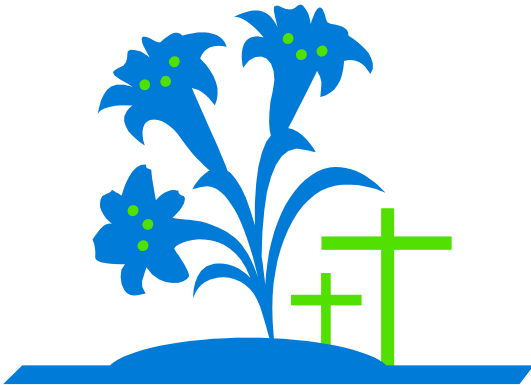

## **From My Perspective Within The Kingdom**

In a recent issue of *The Christian Century* (February 20, 2007, p. 33), I came upon this story told by James Howell, who is the pastor of Myers Park United Methodist Church in Charlotte, NC. He writes: "I remember my sixth-grade Sunday school teacher, Floyd Busby. Mr. Busby would score a flat zero on teaching technique or age-appropriate planning. He was old and had a whiny voice, and his "technique" was to open his Bible and read – for an hour. But I remember Mr. Busby's name and the profound moment when he simply stopped reading. We suspected that he had died. But when we looked up, we realized that he was crying back in the O60s, when men didn't cry. We were tempted for a nanosecond or two to poke fun at him but even as 11-year-olds we knew the moment was to be revered. Mr. Busby gathered himself and read further, about how they arrested Jesus, mocked him, beat him, pressed a crown of thorns into his forehead. He stopped again, looked up at us boys with tears streaming down his face and dripping onto his open Bible, and pleaded with us: "Don't you boys see what they did to my Lord?" I will never forget it. This was my first encounter with someone who was so deeply in love with Christ.

As we turn the page of the calendar, from March to April, Holy Week immediately greets us. As we move through this last week of Jesus' earthly life and ministry - beginning with his entry into Jerusalem seated atop a donkey, watching as he washes his disciples feet and breaks the bread and pours the cup at his last supper with his disciples, following

him through his "kangaroo court," his subsequent sentencing, beating and humiliation, and finally watching him die on the cross (only to rise again from the dead on the third day!) are we, like Mr. Busby, deeply in love with Jesus Christ our Lord and our Savior? When we reflect on all that Jesus went through, for our sakes and for the sins of the world, how can we help but love him with all of our heart, mind, soul, and strength?

Several years ago, Jody and I, along with some 50 other pastors in the Martinsville-Henry County area, were invited to a preview screening of *The Passion of the Christ*. We were totally unprepared for that heart-wrenching experience. It was unfathomable to think of the pain and suffering that Jesus endured throughout that last week of his earthly life, particularly the events from his arrest to his last breath and death on the cross. I started to write that it was so quiet in the movie theater, you could have heard a pin drop. But, no, that's not true at all. All you could hear were people quietly sobbing and blowing their noses throughout the theater. I was wasted! Jody and I drove back to the church in silence, and then I went home to be alone with my thoughts for another 2-3 hours. My senses were on "system overload."

When we are moved powerfully by all that Christ endured during the last week of his life for you, and me, and an entire world I hope our love for Jesus Christ only grows by leaps and bounds. Furthermore, like Mr. Busby, I hope we will do our part to tell others how much our Lord means to us. After all, why keep good news to ourselves?

### **A Word from the Associate Pastor**

April, the final month of Lent in 2007, has now arrived. During the last week of Lent, which is Holy Week, there will be a number of special opportunities to praise God through worship. On Palm Sunday, April 1, we will leave from the narthex at 9:45 a.m. to walk over to the Wilson Park for our annual Palm Sunday in the Park. One of my favorite parts of that service is at the very beginning, when we see people walking into the park from all different directions, from all the different area congregations. It is a powerful symbol of the fact that, even though we go to different churches around the community, we are united in our faith in Christ and our belief that serving him can bring God's kingdom to this earth. Then at the 11:00 a.m. service on Palm Sunday, our seventh grade confirmation class will be presented as members of this church.

Then on Maundy Thursday, April 5, we will have a pot-luck supper in fellowship hall at 6:00. Bring enough to feed your family and enjoy the delicious spread. After we have been well fed, we will gather in the sanctuary at 7:00 p.m. for worship, including the sacrament of the Lord's Supper. We will take communion by intinction, where you tear off a piece of bread from the common loaf and dip that bread into the cup of grape juice.

I am excited that for the second consecutive year, we will have a Good Friday worship service, on April 6 at noon. Good Friday is really a quite somber day because we remember Christ's sacrificial death on the cross that took place on that day. Christ's death was painful, humiliating, and difficult, yet our Lord was willing to endure that hardship for our sake. Five local Presbyterian pastors will join Randy and I in leading the Good Friday service, as each one of the seven of us will talk briefly about Jesus' Seven

Last Words on the cross before his death.

Finally, Holy Week will culminate with a glorious Easter service where we proclaim that Christ is risen; he is risen indeed. As I thought about the theme of resurrection for Easter, I came across this story. A father and his seven-year-old daughter were driving around on a beautiful spring day. A great big yellow bee flew into the car. The seven-year-old girl was very afraid, and so was the father.

They tried desperately to get the bee out of the car. But they were unsuccessful. The bee kept buzzing in front of them, which made the girl hysterical. Her father shouted at her to calm down and not be afraid, which only made her scream louder.

About that time, the bee landed on the father's neck and stung him. And now the little girl became petrified and cried and cried. The father finally said to her: "You don't need to be afraid anymore. The bee has lost its sting. Its stinger is right here in my neck. So the bee has lost its sting."

On that first Easter, Jesus essentially said, "Where, O death, is your victory? Where O death is your sting?" On Easter, the sting of death was overcome. The stinger is located in the marks on Jesus' hands since he was nailed to that dreadful cross. So as we move toward Easter, I invite you to join us in worship, in services that will allow you to grow in your knowledge and appreciation of our Lord and Savior who has removed the sting of death.

## HOLY WEEK

Since Holy Week takes place the first week of April, here is a heads-up on what to expect. The week begins with the annual Palm Sunday in the Park on Sunday, April 1, as we join with other Christian friends from neighboring churches in remembering Jesus' final entry into Jerusalem; as before, we will gather in the narthex of the sanctuary at 9:45 a.m. and then walk to the park for the 10:00 a.m. worship service, which will last a half hour. During our 11:00 a.m. worship service we will celebrate the Confirmation-Commissioning service for six of our youth; there will not be the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper since it will be observed later in the week.

On **Maundy Thursday**, April 5, we will gather in the fellowship hall for a potluck supper at 6:00 p.m. and worship (with communion by intinction or served in the pews) will follow at 7:00 p.m.

On **Good Friday**, April 6, we will have a worship service in the sanctuary at noon; seven Presbyterian ministers will offer reflections on the Seven Last Words of Jesus from the cross.

**Easter Sunday** (April 8) we will gather for breakfast in the fellowship hall at 9:30 a.m., followed by Sunday School at 10:00 a.m., and a special, joy-filled worship service at 11:00 a.m. Please make plans to attend these special events and make your Holy Week experience more meaningful as we approach the cross and prepare to encounter the empty tomb and the risen Christ!



**Palm Sunday in the Park:** We will gather on the front porch of the sanctuary on Palm Sunday (April 1st) at 9:30 a.m. We will receive our

palms and proceed to the park for a worship service beginning at 10. This is an ecumenical service: several other churches in the surrounding neighborhood also participate.

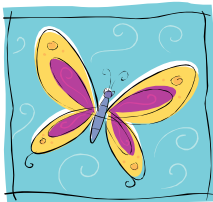
