From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

Perhaps you have seen or heard this story because it has been circulating a long time. I used it in a sermon that I preached in 1985 for my home church's 90th anniversary celebration in St. Louis, MO, and I have seen it periodically as an e-mail message that makes the rounds every so often. But each time, it still speaks to me and I hope it will speak to you as well. The story goes like this:

A churchgoer wrote a letter to the editor of a newspaper and complained that it made no sense to go to church every Sunday. "I've gone for 30 years now," he wrote, "and in that time I have heard something like 3,000 sermons. But for the life of me, I can't remember a single one of them. So I think I'm wasting my time and the pastors are wasting theirs by giving sermons at all." This started a real controversy in the "Letters to the Editor" column, much to the delight of the editor. It went on for weeks until someone wrote this clincher. "I've been married for 30 years now. In that time my wife has cooked some 32,000 meals. But, for the life of me, I cannot recall the entire menu for a single one of those meals. But I do know this... They all nourished me and gave me the strength I needed to do my work. If my wife had not given me those meals, I would be physically dead today... Likewise, if I had not gone to church for nourishment, I would be spiritually dead today!"

Since I was about five years old, I have gone to church (Sunday School and worship services) for most of my life. And, like the first letter to the editor, I can't recall too many lessons or sermons. In fact, I will confess there are times when I am hard pressed to remember what I preached the week before! But, as I reflect on my journey through this life, while I too cannot remember all of those thousands of Sunday School lessons and sermons, which I either heard, taught, or preached, I do remember the kindness of a Sunday School teacher, who took our entire Sunday School class to the St. Louis zoo for an entire day; the commitment of a husband and wife team, who sponsored the Senior High school youth group for years; the pastor who came to my basketball game on a Saturday night or the pastor, who invited my parents to call him by his first name rather than by his title; and the list goes on and on. There was a lot of spiritual nourishment, food for the soul, that took place throughout my life, and the same is true today – for me and for the church, whenever and wherever it gathers in Christ's name.

This month ahead offers us wonderful opportunities to gather for study, worship, and fellowship – and to grow in the faith as we hear the Good News of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, who was crucified and resurrected for us all. I invite you and challenge you to take part in the Holy Week experiences – Palm Sunday in the Park with other area churches and then here at our church; the Maundy Thursday supper and then worship service with the Sacrament of the Lord's supper; the Good Friday service at noon with reflections on Jesus' seven last words; the joyous celebration of the risen Christ on Easter Sunday - and other worship services including the Chancel Choir's musical service on Sunday, April 26 (11:00 a.m.). I won't be hurt or offended if you don't remember all that was said or sung. But I do hope that you will be fed and will leave here nourished, satisfied, hungering for more, full of God's love, and warmed by the Christian fellowship as you interact with other saints. Let us feast on the abundance of God's grace!

Chancel Choir

Our next worship-music service will be on April 26 at the 11:00 a.m. worship hour. The title will be “Darkness and Light”, and will combine both the Passion Week themes with the Jesus, The Light of the World theme.

The service will consist of Congregational Singing, Scripture, as well as Seven Choral Meditations on the “Last Words of Christ”, by Dale Wood. Octavos for the second part of the service will include “Mary Speaks”, by Daniel E. Gawthrop, sung by a women’s quartet; “The Glory of the Father”, by Egil

A TRIBUTE TO FIRST PRESBYTERIAN SCOUTING AND LEADERS

The following article is an edited version of a Minute for Mission talk given on February 22, 2009 by Charlie Miller, leader of First Presbyterian's Boy Scout Troop 61. At the request of several congregational members, it is being printed in Steepleviews to acknowledge the rich history of the scouting ministry at First Presbyterian Church.

Charlie speaks: "For the past 73 years, from 1936 – 2009, your church has sponsored a Boy Scout troop. I suspect this is one of the oldest outreach programs we have had going continually. It's been every Tuesday night for 73 years. That's about 3,650 meetings, about 1,971 nights camping, and 475 nights of week long summer camp. That's a lot of commitment from our congregation!

"What have we received from our investment? I personally have been a part of 32 Eagle Scout ceremonies. Eagle Scout number 33 will be presented next month. I have seen young scouts grow into young men and those young men have become fathers of sons who are now into scouting. The leadership provided by our church has

set an example for others within and beyond our own church.

“Currently, we have an active membership of thirteen scouts and five leaders. There are larger troops, but the First Presbyterian troop #61 is one of the oldest with a rich history and legacy of leadership and a bright future. From all of the troop scouts and leaders, we thank you for your support.”

For over thirty-two years, Charlie Miller has been an active, dedicated leader of Troop 61. For his loyal leadership, diligence, and his Christian influence and steadfastness in this long standing church ministry, on behalf of his First Presbyterian church family, the Mission/Evangelism Committee salutes him and offers him heartfelt thanks and best wishes for many more years of scouting.

The last Lenten supper and worship

service will be on the first Wednesday of this month, April 1. Maundy Thursday (when Jesus shared the Last Supper with his disciples in the upper room) is April 9. We will have a covered dish supper at 5:30 in the fellowship hall, and everyone is encouraged to bring a favorite casserole or special dish, and a dessert to share with others. We will then move upstairs to the sanctuary for the worship service at 7:00 p.m. During worship, we will celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord’s Supper by intinction – people will come forward to the Table to sup by taking the bread and dipping it into the juice, and then they will return to their pews. If you prefer, you can either receive communion from the bread and juice trays on the front Table or an elder can serve you the communion elements in your pew.

The Good Friday Worship Service

will be held at noon, on April 10, in our sanctuary. Once again, the service will focus on the “Seven Last Words” of Christ from the cross. Various hymns and prayers will be interspersed throughout the service.

Preaching at this service will be Hank Baumann, Ken Hughes, Bill Plonk John Wiederholt, Rusty Reaser, and Randy Stevens. This service is very meaningful and everyone is urged to attend.

Easter/Resurrection of the Lord is celebrated on Sunday, April 12.

We will begin with a 9:30 a.m. Easter breakfast in the fellowship hall. The children will participate in an Easter Egg Hunt following the breakfast. Sunday School will begin at 10:00 a.m. and conclude at 10:40 a.m. Then, we will gather in the sanctuary at 11:00 a.m. amidst the beautiful and fragrant Easter lilies, and “pull out all the stops” as we worship the risen Lord and proclaim his resurrection victory over death! There will be only one worship service this day.

Please join with your church family and friends for as many of these worship and fellowship events as possible. Your presence and involvement will make Holy Week that much more meaningful!
