From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

Midway through the month of January I celebrated my sixth anniversary with the church. It is hard for me to realize that much time has slipped by so quickly. I have often said that ministers mark the passage of time in terms of Sundays and, to my way of thinking, there are only about three or four days in between Sundays - they go by in a blur! An anniversary is always an occasion to reflect on what has taken place and what's up ahead.

I think an appropriate place to begin is with the grace of God! I believe it was the grace of God that called and led me to be the pastor here, and I am humbled by and grateful for God's grace in my life and in the life of this congregation. My life has been enriched and blessed by the gift of so many friendships within the church and the larger community. There is indeed a "blessed tie" that binds our hearts to Christ Jesus and, through him, to each other. I feel very privileged to share life. love, and faith with the members of the church, the Session, and the staff. In particular, I am grateful for the many ways that you have ministered to me and my family throughout our son's (Andrew) battle with cancer and Laura's various eve surgeries. Because of your many prayers and kind, loving actions, I have greater appreciation for the Apostle Paul's words in Galatians 6:2 - "Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law (of love) of Christ." Thank you for being there for us during some turbulent and uncertain times.

I remember the very first Sunday I stood before you in worship. I didn't know too many of you and you didn't know me. I remember being very nervous and my breathing was rapid and shallow. However, as I began to preach and bring you God's Word, I found myself relaxing because I was on familiar ground. I remember thinking that, by the grace of God, this was my flock to love and tend to, and I was excited about building bridges and new friendships. Over the course of these six years, I have enjoyed many opportunities to be with you and share your joys and concerns. We have laughed together and we have worked hard to strengthen Christian community in this place. I rejoice at all that we have done together - both within the church and the larger world - in the name and ministry of Jesus Christ.

At the same time, there are certain remembrances that cause pain. By my count, over the past six years, some forty-plus church members, who were actively involved in worship here in our midst, are no longer with us in a physical sense; they have entered the heavenly kingdom and now surround us within that great cloud of witnesses, and I miss them very much. I wish that all or at least most of the church's members were in worship and Sunday School every Sunday, but, sad to say, that is not the case; we are less than we could be and that frustrates me. I regret that there have been some problems in the church that have caused distress and pain; I pray for God's peace, healing, and reconciliation (as well as our own ability to forgive both ourselves and others) to

take place in the life of our church. I hope for unity amidst our diversity.

As we journey forth into 2008 (and the start of my seventh year), I find that I am very hopeful for what is yet to be. Again, the grace of God has more in store for us - of that, I am sure! The success of our New Consecration Sunday emphasis, which enabled us to fund every item within the proposed 2008 budget, gives me further reason to hope. Your financial support of the ministry we plan to do for the Lord within this year speaks volumes!

A Word from the Associate Pastor:

This year, I came up with several New Year's resolutions and had the best of intentions to follow through with them. I have made some limited progress so far, but also find myself feeling frustrated at being pulled in so many different directions. How do we organize our lives? How do we maintain our focus on what is really important? I received this email recently and it helped me put things into perspective. Perhaps it will be beneficial for you, as well.

When things in our lives seem almost too much to handle, when twenty-four hours in a day is not enough, we can remember the mayonnaise jar and two cups of coffee. A professor stood before his philosophy class and had some items in front of him. When the class began, wordlessly, he picked up a very large and empty mayonnaise jar and proceeded to fill it with golf balls. He then asked the students if the jar was full. They agreed that it was.

The professor then picked up a box of pebbles and poured them into the jar. He shook the jar lightly. The pebbles rolled into the open areas between the golf balls. He then asked the students again if the jar was full. They agreed it was. The professor next picked up a box of sand and poured it into the jar. Of course, the sand filled up everything else. He asked once more if the jar was full. The students responded unanimously, "yes." The professor then produced two cups of coffee from under the table and poured the entire contents into the jar, effectively filling the empty space between the sand. The students laughed. "Now," said the professor, as the laughter subsided, "I want you to recognize that this jar represents your life. The golf balls are the important things - God, family, children, health, friends, and favorite passions -- things that if everything else was lost and only they remained, your life would still be full. The pebbles are the other things that matter like your job, house, and car. The sand is everything else -- the small stuff. "If you put the sand into the jar first," he continued, "there is no room for the pebbles or the golf balls The same goes for life. If you spend all your time and energy on the small stuff. you will never have room for the things that are important to you. So .

... Pay attention to the things that are critical to your happiness. Play With your children. Play another 18. There will always be time to clean the house and fix the disposal. "Take care of the golf balls first -- the things that really matter. Set your priorities. The rest is just sand." One of the students raised her hand and inquired what the coffee represented. The professor smiled. "I'm glad you asked. It just goes to show you that no matter how full your life may seem, there's always room for a couple of cups of coffee with a friend." What is Lent? Lent is a period of prayer and reflection that begins on Ash Wednesday, March 1st and ends on Easter Sunday April 16th. Lent is a holy season of preparation for the church. During Lent, we follow Jesus on the road towards Jerusalem and his death on the cross for our sake. Lent recognizes that life is full of temptations and that we too often succumb to sin and distance ourselves from God's will. In Lent, God calls us to a time of simplicity where we focus our attention on God's voice. GRACE NETWORK NEEDS

First Presbyterian Church is still responsible for Spaghetti Sauce this year. Grace Network is distributing on average 30-35 cans of Spaghetti Sauce per week. According to their present inventory, they have approximately a four month supply in stock (I'm guessing around 480 cans). So, they said we are doing extremely well with our responsibility.

However, at this time they do have a critical shortage of one lb. bags of rice. They use an average of 35 one-pound bags of rice per week and presently have less than a two-day stock.

They also have approximately a two-week stock of 5 lb. bags of sugar.

The 2008 Budget has been approved. Due to a very successful New Consecration Sunday and the generous pledging of our members, the balanced budget includes \$624,000 of income and projected expenses. Some budget highlights include major increases in Facilities for painting, funding for Contemporary Worship, salary increases, and significant increases in Benevolences at both the local level and Presbytery. The 2008 Budget reflects \$91,000 of increased income over 2007. Barring any unexpected emergencies, the 2008 Budget will enable the Church to operate without utilizing our reserve funds. Based on current economic conditions, we are truly blessed. **Bob Davis**
