FROM MY PERSPECTIVE WITHIN THE KINGDOM

The month of January gets its name from Roman mythology Janus was the god (lower case “g”) who was guardian of portals and patron of beginnings and endings. Janus is depicted as having two faces; one face was in front looking forward and the other face was at the back of his head looking backward. As we step into January, and thus, enter into a brand new year, I find myself mimicking Janus (without worshipping him!) I, too, find it helpful to look back over the previous year while, at the same time, I look forward and wonder what’s ahead, what’s around the bend. I flip through the pages of my 2006 calendar and I am amazed at how fast the time has flown and the many activities (visits, meetings, trips, etc.) that I managed to fit into 12 months. Then, I flip forward on my 2007 calendar. While these pages aren’t nearly as “inked over” to the same extent as last year’s pages, nevertheless, the 28-31 blocks (for each day in a given month) are beginning to be filled in with notations concerning coming events and other happenings. I look back over 2006 and I am filled with gratitude. It has been a good year both personally and professionally speaking. I especially note with profound joy how far our son, Andrew, has come in his fight against cancer. Having been diagnosed with stage-4 cancer back in May 2005, he has “come a long way, Baby!” He had surgery back in April and has endured numerous chemotherapy treatments. Monica, Andrew, and I met with an oncologist at Duke in June and heard once again the grim statistics regarding his cancer. Later, that same week, Andrew

talked with his oncologist in Richmond, who told Andrew that when he first saw Andrew in his office he thought to himself that Andrew probably had about four months to live. So, here it is, over a year and a half later. and Andrew is looking and feeling well. Throughout this long, hard ordeal I have learned anew just how precious the gift of each day truly is and that fills me with gratitude and joy. I also know that there’s nothing like family, church family, and friends. Also, our joy was deepened when Andrew and Sarah Junod married in October (in my former church, the First Presbyterian Church of Richmond, VA) and I co-officiated. What a blessing Sarah has been to Andrew and to our family. We are blessed indeed! The new year finds Andrew scheduled for further surgery. An oncological surgeon, who only operates on the liver, will remove the last detectable spots (3-4) of cancer in Andrew’s liver. More chemotherapy will probably take place afterwards. Will Andrew be “cancer free?” We really can’t say, but we know this surgery and subsequent chemo treatments will increase his chances of beating or living with the cancer. Thus, we are both grateful and hopeful as we turn and face this new year. As always, thank you all for being on this journey with us, for helping us to be strong, for praying for Andrew and our family, and for being so supportive and understanding when I need to run to Richmond to help out when he is undergoing chemotherapy. That’s a gift you have given to me that I can never, ever repay. I can only be profoundly grateful. As I have said before and often (quoting someone else): “We do not know what the future

holds, but, we know WHO holds us in the future.” That will preach!

Word from the Associate Pastor:

I am writing this article during the week before Christmas, so it has been hard for me to think beyond Christmas and towards January. Is it time already to wave goodbye to 2006? Before we get too far into 2007, I think it is appropriate to give thanks for the ways in which this congregation has provided opportunities for all of us to catch the Christmas spirit. Almost 30 youth and adults from our church participated in Christmas Cheer as we packed a thousand boxes for needy families in Martinsville & Henry County. The Christmas pageant, “On Our Way to Bethlehem”, tugged on our heartstrings as the work of Betsy Haskins, her many volunteers, and the children really paid off. The “Christmas Music Celebration”, led by Bob Chapman, Cynthia Dobrinski, and the adult choir, took us on a journey through many favorite Advent hymns, Christmas carols, and even the fable, “Brother Heinrich’s Christmas.” The congregation purchased and returned over 60 angel tree gifts; the food and presents that we delivered as part of the Angel Tree Project brought smiles to the faces of so many needy people in our community. I even saw a few tears of joy. Christmas Share has raised thousands of dollars for local charities and community service agencies. The Christmas caroling at King’s Grant brought the Christmas spirit both to our youth group and to the residents who joined in and sang along with us. And by the time you will have read this article, we will have had the opportunity to participate in three distinct and meaningful worship services on Christmas Eve.

As I was thinking past all of these Christmas activities towards the New Year, I came across a story that spoke to me; perhaps you will also find it touching. A store owner was tacking a sign above his door that read "Puppies For Sale." Signs like that have a way of attracting small children, and sure enough, a little boy appeared under the store owner's sign. "How much are you going to sell the puppies for?" he asked. The store owner replied, "Anywhere from \$30 to \$50." The little boy reached in his pocket and pulled out some change. "I have \$2.37," he said. "Can I please look at them?" The store owner smiled and whistled and out of the kennel came Lady, who ran down the aisle of his store followed by five teeny, tiny balls of fur. One puppy was lagging considerably behind. Immediately the little boy singled out the lagging, limping puppy and said, "What's wrong with that little dog?" The store owner explained that the veterinarian had examined the little puppy and had discovered it didn't have a hip socket. It would always limp. It would always be lame. The little boy became excited. "That is the puppy that I want to buy." The store owner said, "No, you don't want to buy that little dog. If you really want him, I'll just give him to you." The little boy got quite upset. He looked straight into the store owner's eyes, pointing his finger, and said, "I don't want you to give him to me. That little dog is worth every bit as much as all the other dogs and I'll pay full price. In fact, I'll give you \$2.37 now, and 50 cents a month until I have him paid for." The store owner countered, "You really don't want to buy this little dog. He is never going to be able to run and jump and play with you like the other puppies." To his surprise, the little boy reached down and rolled up his pant leg to reveal a badly twisted, crippled left

leg supported by a big metal brace. The boy looked up at the store owner and softly replied, "Well, I don't run so well myself, and the little puppy will need someone who understands!" Christmas is a time when we focus on the incarnation, how God has taken on human flesh through the miraculous birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. Since Jesus Christ has lived on this earth, amidst all of life's pains, joys, and hardships, Christ can relate to us and sympathize with us. I think much of the time, all any of us want is someone who will understand us. In Jesus Christ, we have someone who is always there to listen to our prayers, understands our deepest desires, knows our biggest worries, and loves us more than we can ever imagine. I am glad that Christ understands us and is willing to accept us, even with our flaws, like the boy is willing to care for the dog with the limp. Thanks be to God!
