Towards the end of last year, following the Officers' Retreat in the fall, the Session of our church adopted the following Mission Statement: **"Share God's love, embrace our neighbors, nurture each other."** That Mission Statement declares what we will strive to do in response to God's gracious love poured out upon us. We are reminded of our three-fold response to God whenever we hold a Sunday bulletin in our hands, pick up the monthly *Steepleviews*' newsletter, or read the agenda for one of the seven committees of the Session.

"Share God's love, embrace our neighbors, nurture each other" is the standard by which we will examine ourselves. When we hold this mission impetus up, do we see ourselves living out what we think is most important in terms of what we are called by God to do in the world? This mission statement is intended to guide both the Session and the entire congregation as well as every group within the church such as the Sunday School classes, the youth groups, Presbyterian Women, the various choirs, and so on.

When you stop to think about it, our strong desire to "share God's love, embrace our neighbors, nurture each other" is deeply rooted in scripture. Our mission statement is a loud echo of the answer Jesus gave to the question, "Which commandment is the first of all?" Jesus answered, "The first is, 'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these." (Mark 12:28-31).

We share God's love because there is so much of God's love to go around. God's love cannot be hoarded; it is to be shared. We take God's love into the world and share it with our neighbors; and, there is still more than enough of God's love with which to nurture each other. During my college years, I remember hearing a friend say that the word *JOY* was an acronym that stood for: J - Jesus; O - others; and Y - yourself; when you love in that order of priorities, then you experience true joy. Life may not always be that simple, and yet, there is a profound truth found within that simple explanation.

Jesus' commandment to love God and neighbor (as yourself) had been stated before in the Hebrew Scriptures. But Jesus was the first to put the two commandments together; he expanded the notion of neighbor from a fellow Jew to encompass everybody (especially those in need); and, most of all, Jesus emphasized and lived out these two commandments, and he taught all of his disciples to go and do likewise!

In all that we say and do, may we (as individuals and as a congregation of God's people) resolve to "share God's love, embrace our neighbor, (and) nurture each other" – all to the glory of God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

Pentecost will be celebrated at First



Presbyterian this year on Sunday, May 31, 2009. Pentecost is the third most important Christian holiday of the year (Easter and Christmas are the two

most significant holidays). Pentecost is the birthday of the church when the early church recognized the gift of the Holy Spirit. The liturgical color of Pentecost is red, which represents the tongues of fire and the power of the Holy Spirit.

We are inviting everyone in the congregation to wear red this Sunday, so there will be a "sea of red" in the congregation. Following worship, there will be refreshments served on the lawn, including a birthday cake with red icing to commemorate the church's birthday!
