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## From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

In October of 2007, I received an invitation through the Presbytery of the Peaks to be part of a group called *Rehoboth 4*. I had no idea what a Rehoboth was but I soon found out what it meant and what it was intended to do. *Rehoboth* comes from the Hebrew and it means “broad places, room, or wide, free spaces” (see Genesis 26:22). In its modern context, the *Rehoboth* program was funded by the Lilly Endowment to sustain pastoral excellence, and it was administered through Union-PSCE in Richmond. Pastors and Christian Educators were selected in ten presbyteries in the Virginias and Carolinas for peer learning and sharing, support, and accountability.

I was one of eleven persons within the Presbytery of the Peaks (from various sized churches) that showed up for that first *Rehoboth 4* meeting. I had served on a task force with one of the pastors and I recognized some others, but a few were strangers to me. Every one of us wondered what we were getting into and what was being asked of us. We made plans to meet again, and the project’s design was that we would come together for three retreats (four days each time) over a period of eighteen-months. We did that and, even though the money and the formal commitment has ended, our group has continued to meet for periodic one-day planning meetings and checking in with each other along with one retreat a year, which we enjoyed this past April 9-12.

These ten colleagues have become very dear friends with whom I enjoy “the grace of Christian fellowship” (to borrow from Dietrich Bonhoeffer in his small but powerful book, *Life Together*). I think there are several key factors that made our group click and become one. From the very beginning, we entered into covenant with God and one another to be very honest, open, and vulnerable with each other. We wouldn’t hide behind a mask and pretend everything was just fine when it wasn’t really that way at all. We risked being authentic with one another and sharing our personal and professional joys, struggles, and pains. We discussed what was working in our various churches and what wasn’t. We worshipped, discussed helpful books and movies, and listened deeply to one another’s story. We cried together when moved by each other’s pain, and we enjoyed playing some board games (Balderdash and Apples to Apples) to the point that, at times, we laughed so hard we cried. Moving and living together between those extremes of utter seriousness and silliness, we bonded, by the grace of God, in ways we never could have imagined. We have experienced the deep joy of fulfilling the new commandment to “love one another,” and our lives are enriched by each other.

What is good and genuine about *Rehoboth 4* is also available right here within the fellowship of First Presbyterian Church of Martinsville, VA. It is the very same grace of God that has called and brought us together in Christian fellowship. God has given us as gifts to one another so that, as we bless one another, we are blessed in turn. There are many opportunities to gather in small groups to learn from each other, to laugh together, and to engage one another on a deeper, spiritual level. I am profoundly grateful to God for the rich blessings I have received through our *Rehoboth 4* group and this congregation of God’s people. “How very good and pleasant it is when kindred live together in unity” (Psalm 133:1). Thanks be to God, through the crucified-yet-risen Christ, for the gift of Christian community wherever it abounds.

Little realizations like that, as well as stories and memories of people and experiences, have stuck with me throughout the years. Mission Trips are opportunities for us to help other people in the name of Christ, but also those people help us to grow in our faith and can be powerful signs of Christ to us! Please keep all of our youth and adult participants in your prayers during the trip, and we look forward to sharing our experiences with you when we return!

#### ***Sunday, June 12,***

**Please mark *Sunday, June 12*, on your calendar for it is a very special day in the life of the church (and our congregation!). That particular Sunday is noted in the church's liturgical calendar as the Day of Pentecost. In his book, *Worship Notes for the Sunday Bulletin*, J. Dudley Weaver, Jr. writes: "Pentecost concludes the celebration of the 50 days of Easter in the church' calendar. On this day the group of cautious and still frightened disciples who gathered in a room in Jerusalem were emboldened and empowered for the work to which Jesus had called them. The promised power of the Holy Spirit came upon them with a force that drove them out of hiding into the streets of Jerusalem to testify to the remarkable love and power of God in Jesus, who was crucified but is now risen to rule. They spoke in the languages of the nations, indicating the worldwide scope of the Christian mission... Pentecost is a day of great celebration, a day when we focus on our empowerment for ministry and renew our commitment to the work of being the church of the risen Christ in the world. The color of Pentecost is red, for flames of fire, for the enlivening power of the Holy Spirit." (Pages 28-29) In light of the above, it is highly appropriate that we will confirm and commission Grey Thomas Ferguson, Emily Rachel Goldstein, Matthew Stewart Mason, and Mattie Mason Wingfield on this special day as they publicly profess their faith before the congregation and are recognized as full, active members within our church. planned to follow the 11:00 a.m. worship service.

**Please note:** the Session encourages everyone (members and friends) **to wear red on Pentecost Sunday** as we gather to celebrate God's gift of the Holy Spirit, the birthday of the church, and the joy of witnessing the faith development and journey of Grey, Emily, Matthew, and Mattie!

### Summer Adult Sunday School


### Traveling Day Camp
