From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

As I write this article, we have just celebrated Laity Sunday in the life of our church (and Youth Sunday was the previous month). Besides having the day off from leading in worship (which I love to do), it was a real joy for me to see our church members "living their faith out loud." I was proud of them, and I was also deeply appreciative of their faith in action.

I am reminded of an article in my files in which Stanley M. Hauerwas talks about Lay Sunday at his church. "Three of our laity testified as part of our worship. The first one was a young mother, wife of an intern, who had three children. She had been raised Roman Catholic, in Alabama. Now a Methodist, she told us that her life mainly involved bringing up their children as part of the Church by teaching them the stories of the Bible, by bringing them to church to be reminded of their Baptism, and helping them learn what it means to be a member of the Body of Christ. She said, 'I know that it is not much, but right now I think that's what God wants me to do.'

"Next was a young man. He had a job in a state agency – a bureaucrat. He said that he had to come to church because he has to be reminded that Christians do not lie. He has to be reminded of that because he said every day at his job he is surrounded with lies and it's so hard to resist not becoming part of the system of lies. So he comes each Sunday in hopes of renewing his speech so he will not lie on the job. This may not contribute to his advancement, but he would rather be a Christian.

"Finally, an elderly widow in the congregation testified that for her Christianity and quilting were closely connected. She told us how during World War II she had served in the Navy as a cryptographer to break down the codes of the Japanese Navy. She said she'd really never thought during that time about the people that they were fighting. However, now she ran an international quilting bee which attracted many graduate student spouses from the nearby university. In the process, she had met several young Japanese women who were anxious to learn the art of quilting, and through them she had discovered Japanese Christianity. In the process she had gained a sense of the horror of what it meant for us to drop the atomic bomb on Japan. She continued that even though it may not seem like much, she found her quilting a way to be tied to Christians around the world. She noted that, though it might be silly, the quilters thought they ought to do something to suggest that commitment. So a number of the quilting societies encouraged their members to do 3 by 5 quilts and come to Washington and surround the Pentagon with their quilts. That was the way she made a contribution to the world as a Christian." (Stanley M. Hauerwas and William H. Willimon, *Where Resident Aliens Live*, Nashville: Abingdon, 1996)

My hat is off to church members everywhere, who, in their own quiet way, are effective witnesses to their Lord and their faith to their family members, friends, neighbors, acquaintances, and community. I am grateful for all of the saints, who strive to make a difference in the life of the world because of their belief in Jesus Christ. And, I especially appreciate and am profoundly grateful for our own members, who are involved in the life of our congregation and the larger community. Thanks be to God for your faithful witness, wherever you are, in whatever you do.

<u>The Chancel Choir</u> The Chancel Choir will present a Service of Lessons and Carols on Sunday evening, December 18, at 7 o'clock.

The service be presented in several sections with a reading and congregational hymn for most sections. The scriptures will be read by Judy Mattox, Jim Beard, John Bowles, Lang Mauck, Rusty Reaser, and Ed Linker. Randy Stevens, Pastor, and Jenny Spivey, Associate Pastor, will offer the prayers and transitions within the service.

The service will begin with the Prelude, played by Cynthia Dobrinski. The choir will process to the hymn-anthem "Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence", arranged by Sandra Ford. The Prophecy scripture will be read by Judy Mattox, followed by an arrangement of "Comfort, Comfort", by John Ferguson. The Annunciation scripture will be read by Jim Beard with the carol, "There is no rose of such virtue", by John Joubert. Mary Ann McConnell will read the Birth scripture followed by, "The Coventry Carol", by Mark Sedio. A repeat anthem, by Craig Courtney, "While Shepherds Lately Knelt", will be sung after the Angels and Shepherds Scripture. The congregation will join the choir in singing Hal Hopson's arrangement of, "Silent Night, Holy Night." Lang Mauck will read the scripture about the Wise Men and the choir will sing John Rutter's,"Three Kings of Orient". The familiar text, "Love Came Down At Christmas', set by Daniel E. Gawthrop, follows the Incarnation scripture, read by Rusty Reaser. As a response to the Prayer of Thanksgiving and Dedication, the choir will sing, "Gloria In Excelsis", by Antonio Vivaldi. Consecration Sunday Is Coming

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes. Our congregation's finance committee has selected the New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. New Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?" During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world. Every attendee and member who completes an Estimate of Giving Card does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our guest leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship. We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team and governing board members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship. Operation Christmas Child "The Shoe Box Project"

This year the youth group is again taking part in a unique mission project called "Operation Christmas Child." Samaritan's Purse operates a number of projects including "Operation Christmas Child", a program where shoeboxes are packed with personal hygiene items, school supplies, toys, and distributed to nearly 8 million children annually in 95 countries. Samaritan's Purse is an International Relief Organization under the direction of CEO and founder, Franklin Graham. To date, this organization has collected and distributed more than 69 million shoeboxes to boys and girls in over 135 countries.

People across the country are getting their items and donations ready to send to their churches. Our youth are asking that all families participate in this project in one of several ways:



- 1) by bringing a filled shoebox with suggested items,
- 2) by bringing empty shoeboxes for the youth to pack (you know they are in your basement!)
- 3) by bringing donations of items on the suggested list below (no used or damaged items please!),
- by making donations to help cover shipping cost (a box takes \$7 to ship worldwide)

Please bring your donation/gift to the church by October 31st. Donations of items and shoeboxes can be brought to Pastor Jenny's office, and monetary donations given to the church office. The youth will pack and gift-wrap shoeboxes during Youth Group meeting on November 6th. The boxes will be delivered to our local drop-off center the week of November 14th. Operation Christmas Child is a great way to bring joy and the Good News of Jesus Christ to children in need of hope. What a perfect gift to give in honor of Jesus' birthday.

Gift Suggestions

Designate your box for the appropriate age category below:

Girl or Boy: Ages (2-4 years), (5-9 years), or (10-14 years)

School Supplies: pens, pencils and sharpeners, crayons or markers, stamps and ink pad sets, writing pads or paper, solar calculators, coloring and picture books, etc.

Toys: small cars, balls, dolls, stuffed animals, kazoos, harmonicas, yo-yos, jump ropes, small Etch A Sketch, toys that light up or make noise (with extra batteries), Slinky, etc.

Hygiene Items: toothbrush, toothpaste, mild bar soap (in plastic bag), comb, washcloth, etc.

Other: hard candy and lollipops (please double bag all candy), mints gum, T-shirts, socks, ball caps, sunglasses, hair clips, toy jewelry, watches, flashlights (with extra batteries).

A Personal Note: In a separate envelope, you may enclose a note to the child and a photo of yourself or your family. (If you include your name and address, the child may write back.)

DO NOT INCLUDE: Used or damaged items; war-related items such as toy guns, knives or military figures; chocolate or food; out–of-date candy; liquids or lotions; medications or vitamins; breakable items such as snow globes or glass containers; aerosol cans.

Session Highlights for October 24, 2011

- Bill Peterson gave the devotional and the opening prayer
- Approved the minutes for the stated Session meeting on September 26, 2011
- Reviewed the treasurer's report for the nine months ending September 31, 2011
- Approved a questionnaire, which will be sent out with a letter to all church members, and then the elders will follow up with home visits in early 2012
- Approved having one service only on Christmas Eve at 5:00 p.m.; approved having, on Christmas Day, a Christmas carol sing in the sanctuary at 10:00 a.m. and the worship service at 11:00 a.m.; and approved having both worship services on New Year's Day

• Changed the name of the *Officer's Handbook* to the *Manual of Operations* and approved the restructuring of the Table of Contents so that it is more userfriendly
