From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

It's officially autumn, which makes it my favorite time of the year. I grew up in St. Louis, MO, which has four distinct seasons. Then, after college, I moved to Texas to go to seminary and serve my first two churches, and I discovered that the parts of Texas where I lived had basically three seasons of the year - cool, hot, and hotter! So, I'm glad to be here in Virginia and experience the four seasons of the year once again - and especially fall! I love the crisp, early morning hours, the leaves starting to change and fall, and the respite from much of the heat and humidity of the summer months.

There are many different reasons why I love autumn, and one of them has to do with a theological reflection. The first Sunday in October (this year, it's Sunday, October 5) is designated as World Communion Sunday. It has been noted that on this particular first Sunday of October more Christians within the one body of Christ will celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper throughout the world, from one time zone to the next as the sun rises over the earth, than at any other time during the year. While there are many differences and divisions among Christians - between the many denominations and even within our own denomination (the Presbyterian Church USA) - at our best, we are united through Christ Jesus within his body, the Church. Throughout my ministry, I have maintained that when Christians profess Jesus Christ as the crucified and risen Lord and Savior, which is the very core of the Christian faith, then, we have far more in common than all the lesser issues that tend to divide us into various camps and groupings. Whenever and wherever Christ is acknowledged as Lord, we are in communion with our sisters and brothers in Christ! Thanks be to God!

World Communion Sunday further reminds me of a rich experience in my first pastorate. In that small town, the Presbyterians and Methodists already participated in a joint Vacation Bible School. One day in late summer, I was talking with Richard, who was the pastor at the Methodist church. We were talking about World Communion Sunday, and, in the midst of our conversation, we decided we needed to act on our beliefs. We both approached our respective church boards with the prospect of having a joint World Communion Sunday worship service, and both boards wholeheartedly agreed to the idea, which became a reality that was celebrated every year. The first year (1980), Richard preached in our church and communion was observed in the Presbyterian fashion by serving people in the pews; the next year, the Methodists hosted the event, I preached, and all of our people came up front to the rail to receive Holy Communion; and so on.

On one occasion, Richard and I were officiating at the Table. Richard recalled how Jesus, after taking the bread, blessed and broke it and said, "Take and eat ye all of it." Then Richard said, "Did you hear that? Jesus said to eat all of it! In other words, don't just take a nibble of the Christian faith. Don't just dip your toe into the waters of baptism. Jesus said, 'ALL of it!' Eat all of it and be sure to live all of the Christian faith in its totality." By my count, that was twenty-eight years ago, but I remember it as if it were yesterday. Richard's words still come to me across the decades, and I share them with you because they are still worth remembering and, even more importantly, those words are still worth living today, tomorrow, and always.

Let us strive to do our best to live ALL of the Christian life to the glory of God!

Word from the Associate Pastor:

This fall, the Tuesday morning Bible study class is studying the book of Acts, which is one of my favorite books of the Bible. In the church, we tend to spend a lot of time on the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, which is appropriate since these four books are the narrative center of our faith. The book of Acts is also invaluable because it shows us how the early church lived together. And they did some exciting, amazing things through the power of the Holy Spirit that was given to them at Pentecost! Those believers put all their differences aside to live in community together, selling each other's possessions and using their money whenever anyone had needs. Apostles like Peter and John healed the sick and the lame in Jesus' name. These early Christians were so committed to their faith, that they were willing to take a stand and face persecution and even death, as Stephen did. And this early church was open to listening for God's will and reaching new understandings of what God was calling them to do, as they realized that Christ came for not just the Jews, but for the entire world (Jews and Gentiles alike).

Reading those stories grounds us, as Christians, and reminds us to keep our focus on the mission and purpose of the church. I have a vision for the church universal and for our church in particular: that we, like the early church, would live as disciples who have a vibrant, meaningful, growing relationship with the Lord. As we read Acts, we can receive inspiration from the many role models of the faith.

One of the most important verses in the entire book of Acts is 2:42, which says, "They (the members of the early church) devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." That verse lists four basic, essential, and timeless practices of the church: teaching, fellowship, breaking bread, and prayer. For a well-balanced spiritual life, we need all four components.

I asked the Bible study class, what would it look like for a church to live out these four practices. A member of the class wisely observed that we did all four practices at Bible Study each and every week! We study the Scriptures together, seeking to understand what happened two thousand years ago and how it applies to our lives today (teaching). We visit with each other and are genuinely interested in what is going on in each other's lives (fellowship). We go over the list of joys and concerns within our church, community, and world and pray together (prayer). After the Bible study is finished, several members of the class will often go out to lunch together (breaking bread). I think it is always healthy for us to ask ourselves, as individuals or as the body of Christ, why it is we do what we do. It is important to take stock of our lives and to understand how what we do is connected with God's plan and purpose. If we are constantly reevaluating our lives, looking for ways God is active, our faith never becomes stale. If we focus on asking the big questions, we will not get distracted by the smaller, petty issues. This month, during our session retreat, our elders will be meeting together to discuss the vision for our church. Please be in prayer for our session and our church as we seek God's will together. I firmly believe that the Holy Spirit, which did amazing things at Pentecost, is alive today and present in our midst.

“Our Musical Pulse”

Usually in September the staff has an opportunity to speak to the congregation and review the previous year’s work. Since September 21 has come and gone and since I usually reprint my comments in this column, here is my 07-08 Adult Music Report.

Last October I returned to work in time to begin preparation for the Fall Music Schedule as well as the Christmas Music Program. The Chancel Choir presented a beautiful, traditional service of Lessons and Carols. During Lent the Chancel Choir combined with the Youth and Children to present a service which centered on Jesus’ Passion Week. Many expressed the hope that this would not be the last time for this combination.

The good news about the membership of the Chancel Choir is we gained some new members. The flip side of that coin is that some members decided not to serve with us any longer. We miss them. Several persons have sung the programs with us and I certainly commend them for this. Of course we want to invite interested singers to join our choir family either full time or for program times.

Our Sanctuary Ringers had a good season this past year. We had a regular substitute who made a big difference from week to week. We rang each month from October thru May in worship and wound up the year with a family cook-out at the Chaney’s lake house. We do have one open position for a Handbell Ringer who has an hour on Wednesday evening and wants a place to serve God through our ministry.

This year both the Singers and Ringers presented a program for our “Coming Home” Fellowship in August. With the Spirituals, Broadway Music, and some old fashion group singing, a good time was had by all.

I want to commend those who blend their talents in our ministry in music in this

church. It would be hard to imagine a service without music. We perform for God and trust He is pleased with our offerings.

Chancel Choir

Our Chancel Choir is busy preparing repertoire for this season of the year. The Advent and Christmas Lessons in Scripture, Reading, and Music is planned and most of the music is in and will be in the folders before October
