From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

As I write this article, the first Sunday of Advent is only a week and a half away and Christmas Eve is five weeks from tonight. Certain radio stations have begun playing Christmas songs this past week and, as usual, various stores have had Christmas decorations up since just after Halloween. So, already "it's beginning to look a lot like Christmas!"

I'm sure you and your family have time-honored Christmas traditions, as does our family. Before Thanksgiving weekend is over, our Christmas tree, numerous nativities, and other decorations will be out of the boxes and on display. Between now and the end of the year, we will sit down and watch treasured movies like It's A Wonderful Life, A Christmas Carol (with George C. Scott playing Scrooge), and A Christmas Story where the young boy Ralphie gets his tongue stuck on a frozen pole. Of course, there are the special Christmas programs and worship services here at the church.

Amidst all of the hustle and bustle of the season, there is something special I do for myself. I get out the book entitled <u>Deliverance to the Captives</u> by Karl Barth and I turn to one of his Christmas Eve sermons, "He Stands By Us," that Dr. Barth preached in 1958 to prison inmates in Basel, Switzerland. This powerful sermon never fails to speak to me, and I want to share an excerpt with you as an early Christmas gift!

The place where the Savior enters in looks rather like the stable of Bethlehem. It is not beautiful, but quite ugly; not at all cozy, but really frightening; not at all decently human, but right beside the animals. You see, the proud or modest inns, and our behavior as their inhabitants, are but the surface of our lives. Beneath, there lurks the depth, even the abyss. Down below, we are only poor beggars, lost sinners, moaning creatures on the threshold of death, only people who have lost their way.

Down there Jesus Christ set up quarters. Even better, he has already done so! Yes, praise be to God for this dark place, for this manger, for this stable in our lives! There we need him, and there he can use each one of us. There he only waits that we see him, recognize him, believe in him, and love him. There he greets us. What else can we do but return his greeting and bid him welcome? Let us not be ashamed that the oxen and donkeys are close by. Precisely there he firmly stands by us all. In this dark place he will have Holy Communion with us. This is what we now shall have with him and with one another. Amen. (Pages 141-142)

I can only hope that that message speaks to you as it does to me. It's good to be reminded that Christmas isn't just about the bright lights and all of the festive decorations around the house. It's also about the dark places within our souls and how Christ Jesus, the light of the world, has exposed the sinful darkness, defeated it on the cross, and set us free to live as the forgiven children of God, now and forever. May the story of his birth bring about a new birth within all of us. And then, it really and truly will be a merry Christmas!
