From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

Since this year marks the 150th anniversary of the Civil War, there are a number of stories told and retold about that watershed event in our nation's life. One story that easily comes to mind is this: In the Ken Burns series on the Civil War that aired on public television, there were a number of scenes of the fiftieth anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg in 1913. A group of old Confederate and Union veterans returned to commemorate the occasion. Old films show the men talking over old times, swapping stories and eating together. Then there was a re-enactment of Pickett's Charge. The old Union soldiers took their places, as they had fifty years earlier, among the rocks on Seminary Ridge. The old Confederate soldiers took their places on the farmland below. After a while the Confederates started to move forward across the broad, flat field where just fifty years before many had died. "We could not see rifles and bayonets," an eyewitness said, "but canes and crutches" as they made their slow advance toward the ridge with the more able-bodied ones helping the disabled ones.

As the Confederate troops got near the Union line, they broke into one long, defiant rebel yell. Then something quite remarkable happened. Unable to restrain themselves any longer the Yankees burst from behind the stone walls and flung themselves upon their former enemies. Only this time, fifty years later, they did not do battle with them. Instead they threw their arms around them. Some in blue, some in gray, the old men embraced one another and wept.

What a difference fifty years made. In that moment they understood that they were created not to do battle with one another but to love one another. For a few brief moments these veterans lived out that truth. (Frederick Buechner, *Theology Today*, January 1993)

What a special story and what makes it even more delightful is that it is true. We hear in that story the gospel truth of how God intends for people to get along, build community, and live in peace. To that end, our Lord calls us to be peacemakers and, when we act faithfully and strive to live out that high calling, we are blessed and called children of God (see Jesus' sermon on the mount in Matthew 5:9).

Someone has said that we are to spread seeds of peace. James L. Brewer-Calvert writes, "The peace that God gives to the world, planted in us by Jesus Christ, nurtured by the Holy Spirit, will foster and grow in the context of community. Cicero in 49 BCE said, 'He plants trees to benefit another generation.' Former Secretary of State Dean Acheson had been retired for many years when he instructed his gardener to plant fruit trees that Acheson had just purchased. The gardener hesitated, saying, 'But, sir, it will be many years before they bear fruit!' 'Well, then,' replied Dean Acheson, 'we had better plant them this afternoon.'"

Let us be on the lookout for those times and ways wherein we can be peacemakers and go about God's business of sowing seeds of peace where "we live and move and have our being." May we strive to live in such a way that we make a difference in the world, and so that others may see the Prince of Peace at work through us!

Word from the Associate Pastor:

As the school year starts up again, the most repeated question for students and parents alike is, “what did you do this summer?” This summer was indeed a busy time for children and young people in our congregation. Many families took the opportunities to take vacations, to travel, to go to camp – and lots of our families participated in our congregation’s many programs for children and youth. Last month I wrote about the wonderful Mission Trip to Charlotte in June, and Janet Fentress shared a great write-up about Vacation Bible School. But those two weeks were only the beginning of the summer – since their completion, a fabulous group of youth traveled to attend the Montreat Youth Conference at the end of July and our church hosted the Presbytery of the Peaks Day Camp in August.

We participated in small groups that enabled them to form new relationships with young people from many different churches and places. We worshiped together, learned new songs, and heard great speakers and preachers. Each night, our group gathered for a devotion and closing, and during one of those nights we decided that we wanted to share these transformation experiences (from Mission Trip and Montreat) with the congregation. To that end, we will have another Youth Sunday on September 25, 2011 at the 11:00am service. We hope you can all join us and receive the gifts of our young people in leading worship!

The Presbytery Day Camp that we hosted here during the first week in August

was likewise an exciting experience for our church and for the children that attended. Our own Margaret Lester was the Day Camp Director for the whole program, which was held at many different churches in our Presbytery throughout the summer. She and two college student counselors, Kelly and Christina, provided wonderful leadership for our group of 5 campers! This Day Camp was a new project for the Presbytery, and though we started small this summer, we hope it will continue to grow into a program that can minister to children and youth all over our Presbytery!

Youth and Children's Music

Registration for Music Classes for the 2011=2012 year are under way! I am very excited to see everyone again. Please register early so that I can make really great plans and include everyone. Please make copies and send to your neighbors and friends. We are always looking for new friends.

Here is the schedule:

All Classes will begin the week of September 12

Monday: 2:45-4:30 WAM(worship, arts, music) for 1st through 5th graders. This is a wonderful group that plays handbells, recorders (new this year), prepares two plays, sings, and learns about worship and its' meaning. We play together, create art and follow our faith journey as well.

Note: I desperately need another adult to help. This is a large group and our teens are great, but, because of their school schedules, they cannot be present until later in the afternoon. Would you consider coming for a few weeks? Musical ability is not a prerequisite, just someone who loves children!

There is a 20 dollar refreshment fee (per child) for this group.

Tuesday: 11:00 Music Together for children age birth to 3 and a half years old or so. This is a nationally revered program of musical experiences for a child and an adult. We sing, dance, play and grow musically together. The fee for this is \$35 per quarter for a set of beautiful materials including two CDs and a beautiful book.

Noon: Kindermusik I This is another nationally known program that is for the 4-5 year old. This is my 22nd year teaching this curriculum that is perfect for every child. We learn to play a glockenspiel, read notes, play wonderful games and grow musically. We begin at noon with a packed lunch and finish at 1:30

2:45-4:00 Kindermusik II This is the continuation of Kindermusik I. This year we study the music of the world. We make and learn to play a dulcimer and learn to be proficient on recorder. By the time children have finished Kindermusik, they have had experience on a string instrument, woodwind and percussion. It really sets them up for wherever their musical road leads. The children come from three school systems at different times, and we do enrichment til everyone arrives. The fee

for members is \$35 and for non members \$150 for the year.

Middle and High School Handbells-

Come one, come all, no experience necessary! This is a great group that has a blast making super music and playing together. We practice after church a few Sundays a month and try to play in church about once every six weeks. We had a great group last year and I am sure this year will be the very same!

All groups will begin after Labor Day, the Tuesday groups beginning on September 6th and the first WAM meeting on September 12th.

Session Highlights for August 29, 2011

Noted that Catherine Bridges would serve as the acting Clerk in Joan Montgomery's absence

- Forrest Truitt led the Session in an opening devotional and prayer
- Approved the Session minutes for July 25, 2011 (stated) and August 7, 2011 (called)
- Reviewed the treasurer's report for the period ending July 31, 2011
 - Approved the list of 2011-2012 Sunday School teachers
 - Approved the request from the Harvest Foundation to use our Fellowship Hall, kitchen, and several classrooms on Tuesday, August 30, for a Community Health Strategic Planning meeting; the Session also gave the Facilities Committee the authority to approve (or deny) requests from outside groups to use our facilities according to our stated guidelines
 - Agreed to have our fall Officers' Retreat here at the church on Friday evening,

October 7; and, on Saturday, October 8, we will travel to Covenant Presbyterian Church in Roanoke and participate in the Presbytery of the Peaks' 12th Leadership Event.

- Approved having the annual congregational meeting on Sunday, September 18, at 9:45 a.m., during the Sunday School hour (instead of at the close of the 11:00 a.m. worship service); this change in time allows those, who attend the early service to stay for the meeting, and there will also be more time for discussion, questions and answers.
- Approved the continuance of the 8:45 a.m. early worship service in the current format.
- Agreed to propose to the congregation that, under the new Form of Government within the Book of Order, we continue to conduct congregational meetings with a quorum set at 10% of the active members (as it has been in the past)
- Heard reports from the moderators of the Session's committees, the Officer Nominating Committee, and the pastors
- Noted the death of long-time member Ralph Emerson Keys, on Friday, August 26, and that the Witness to the Resurrection service will be on Wednesday, August 31
- After sharing joys and concerns, the meeting was adjourned with prayer by Jenny Spivey.
