Zechariah's Song

Luke 1:68-79

narrative of Jesus' birth, but the gospel actually opens with the story of Zechariah, who was a priest in the temple in the days of King Herod of Judea. Zechariah and his wife, Elizabeth, who was barren, were getting on in years. One day while Zechariah was working in the temple the angel Gabriel appeared to him and announced that Elizabeth would conceive and bear a son whom they were to name John. Not only would they have a son, but God chose this son to be a prophet to prepare the way for the coming of the Lord. Zechariah responded in stunned disbelief. I think most people would have reacted like Zechariah, but Gabriel didn't see it that way. He told Zechariah, "Because you did not believe my words...you will become mute...until the day these things occur." Elizabeth did conceive, and in due course gave birth to John. When it was time to circumcise the child, the family and friends wanted to name him Zechariah after his father, but Elizabeth told them his name was John. They asked Zechariah and he wrote that the child's name would indeed be John. At that point, Zechariah was able to speak and he began praising

When we think of the beginning of Luke's gospel, we immediately think of the

The first four verses praise God for his faithfulness to his promises to raise up a savior and rescue his people.

God. This frightened those who had gathered and everyone wondered exactly what this child would become. The scripture lesson tells us Zechariah was filled with the

Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, for he has looked favorably on his people and redeemed them.

He has raised up a mighty savior for us in the house of his servant David, As he spoke through the mouth of his holy prophets from of old,

That we would be saved from our enemies and from the hand of all who hate us. Thus he has shown the mercy promised to our ancestor, and has remembered his holy covenant,

The oath he swore to our ancestor Abraham to grant us that we, being rescued

from the hands of our enemies, Might serve him without fear, in holiness and righteousness before him all of our days.

The last four verses turn our attention to John and his mission.

And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Most High;
For you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways,
to give knowledge of salvation to his people by the forgiveness of their sins.
By the tender mercy of our God, the dawn from on high will break upon us,
To give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death,
To guide our feet into the way of peace.

These words of Zechariah move me. As a parent, I try to imagine what it must have been like for Zechariah and Elizabeth to conceive a child so late in life and to know their child would prepare the way for the Messiah that all of Israel had been hoping for. The deepest longings of their souls would be satisfied in the birth of two related babies, and their son, John, would have an integral part to play in preparing people to receive the Promised One. Perhaps it was necessary for Zechariah to remain mute for nine months so that he could process what was about to happen. I know that I would have had a hard time taking it all in.

I am also moved by the fact that the first words out of Zechariah's mouth were words of praise, faithfulness, and purpose. Zechariah first praises God for remembering his promises and fulfilling them in the birth of the Messiah who will save and redeem Israel so that Israel may fearlessly serve God in holiness and righteousness. Then Zechariah addresses his newborn son. He proclaims that John will be God's prophet sent to prepare the people for the coming of the Messiah. John will preach the idea of salvation through the forgiveness of sins, and usher in the light that will dawn on a world living in the darkness and death.

The last part of Zechariah's song, in which he references Isaiah 9:2, especially resonates with me. I am sure there were many things in Zechariah's world that caused people to feel as if they were living under a cloud of darkness and the shadow of death. Even so, Zechariah was able to look forward in faith toward the light of the coming Messiah who would banish the forces of darkness. From our 21st Century vantage point, while we still have our share of darkness, we have the advantage over Zechariah in knowing how the story of Jesus, the Messiah, unfolded and is unfolding. We know of Jesus' birth, ministry, death, resurrection, and ascension into heaven. We know that he has come, is with us now through the Spirit, and will come again in glory. During this season of Advent, I pray that our lives will sing out with Zechariah's praise and thanksgiving to our God who keeps his promises to save and redeem us through the gift of our Messiah, our Lord Jesus. May we, like John, prepare the way of the Lord first in our own hearts and then wherever we go in the assurance that the light from above will break upon us and cast out our darkness and lead our feet in the way of God's peace.

Blessed be the Lord, our God! Alleluia! Amen.


community will be featured, along with beautiful Christmas trees on display.

From the Transition Team

When Pastor Mark retired on August 31, our church began the process of finding a new pastor. A Transition Team, made up of Monica Stevens, Denny Casey, and Joan Montgomery was appointed by the Session's Administration Committee. In an effort to keep the congregation informed we want to tell you the work that has been done and the work to be done.

- The Transition Team met with Carl Utley, our General Presbyter, on 9/16/21 for training.
- Responsibilities of the Transition Team are:
- 1. Identify and recommend to the Session a candidate for Interim Pastor;
- 2. Identify Transitional Priorities for Interim start up;
- 3. Consult staff and elders about needs from Interim Pastor;
- 4. Complete the Presbytery's Ministry Information Form (MIF) and seek appropriate approvals. The MIF describes our church in location, membership,

- mission statement, narrative questions, and top 10 Leadership Competencies, salary range, and basically what we are looking for in an Interim Pastor;
- 5. Work with the Interim during transition as requested by Interim; and
- 6. Communicate to congregation about transitional process.
- We were charged with interviewing staff and session members for what they wanted professionally and personally in an Interim Pastor. That has been completed.
- The Transition team met several times to consolidate the interview responses and to complete the MIF.
- The Ministry Information Form was approved by the Session at its November meeting and has been sent to the Presbytery for approval.
- Upon approval, candidates will be identified based on matching our needs with candidate applications.
- The Transition Team is waiting for a date from the Presbytery for our second training on interviewing candidates for the Interim Pastor position.

Although the process seems slow, even to us, we want the congregation to know that the process is moving forward.
