Devotional Meditation Elder, Monica Stevens January 19, 2022

Birds, Sheep, and Goats

Matthew 6:25-34 Matthew 25:21-46

Since the beginning of the pandemic I have been doing much of my study and work at the end of my kitchen table closest to the windows. I like being able to look out the window when I need a break or when I am stuck and needing inspiration. Sometime in the last year I decided to start feeding the birds (and by default the squirrels) that I had noticed perching in my trees. This has been a source of delight for me and a supplement to the birds' normal diet. I haven't put out so much food that the birds would become totally dependent on me, but I have attracted a variety of birds to my yard and my back window sill. When the snow fell this past Sunday I noticed that the number of birds in my yard had significantly increased because many of their normal foraging spots had been covered by the snow and subsequent ice. I increased the amount of seed needed to meet the demand and that caused me to think about the passages from Matthew that I listed above.

In the Matthew 6 passage cited above, Jesus instructs us not to worry about our physical needs.

He says, "Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?" A little later on Jesus tells us not to worry about our clothing comparing us to the lilies of the field that neither toil nor spin, but yet, were more beautifully clothed than even Solomon in his glory. Jesus reminds us that we cannot add even an hour to our lives by worrying. God knows what we need, and God will provide, so worry is unproductive. Instead, Jesus tells us to strive first for the kingdom of God and God's righteousness, and all the things we need will be provided for us. God provides for each of us in one way or another. God provided for the birds before I started feeding them, God provided for the fullness of their needs when I decided to supplement their diet, and when the ground was covered and crusted over with snow and ice,

God provided for them through my willingness to convert some of my resources into bird seed to feed them when their own resources became scarce.

This thought brings me to the Matthew 25 passage listed above. At the final judgement, Jesus says people will be judged and separated as a shepherd divides the sheep from the goats. To one group Jesus will say, "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you because you cared for me and took care of my needs when I couldn't." To the other group Jesus will say, "Depart from me you who are accursed because you didn't help me when I was in need." Both groups will ask when they saw him in need, and Jesus will tell them, "When you helped one of even the least of my family, you helped me, and when you ignored one of even the least of my family you ignored me."

If we listen to Jesus and "strive first for the kingdom of God," we can all learn to live so that the needs of all will be met. We will learn to trust God's grace and abundance and not live our lives in the constant fear of scarcity. When we trust in God's grace, we will be less likely to hoard whatever wealth we have, and we will be more willing to share what we have. Each of us has something different to share. We might have financial resources to share, time to donate to the service of others by working for Grace Network, the Community Breakfast, the Warming Center, or so may other organizations or individual efforts, skills to share to aid someone else, or the ability and drive to work to change public policies that perpetuate systems that unfairly limit whole groups of people. In God's kingdom, we are each blessed so that we can be a blessing to others. The resources of God's kingdom are not meant to be hoarded but used to meet the needs of others. May we each recognize and be grateful for God's abundance in our own lives, and in our gratitude, may we share what we have to the glory of God and the benefit of God's children.

The church office will open for limited appointments. Please call to schedule. Please enter at the narthex for Sunday worship and during the week use the back door at the portico.


