Devotional Meditation Elder, Monica Stevens July 13, 2022

Mary and Martha Luke 10:38-42

Now as they [Jesus and the disciples] were on their way, he entered a certain village, where a woman named Martha welcomed him into her home. She had a sister named Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet and listened to what he was saying. But Martha was distracted by her many tasks; so she came to him and asked, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to do all the work by myself? Tell her then to help me." But the Lord answered her, "Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her.

We are familiar with this short passage of scripture, perhaps too familiar. The usual interpretation of this passage centers on the idea that Martha is distracted because she has so much to do while providing hospitality for Jesus and the disciples while Mary has chosen to sit at Jesus' feet and listen. Martha becomes frazzled, frustrated, and resentful due to her sister's lack of assistance, while Mary seems blissfully unaware of the problem. Jesus seems to side with Mary for choosing the "better part" while chiding Martha's irritation, but is this the only, or even the main lesson found here?

Martha invites Jesus and the disciples into her house and offers them hospitality—food, drink, comfort, and safety. Hospitality was more than just being nice, it was a way of remembering, enacting, and sharing the mercy God had shown the Israelites when they were strangers in Egypt.

Hospitality was written into Jewish Law and was an integral part of Jesus' teaching on mercy throughout the gospels. Hospitality was indeed important not only on a practical level, but on a spiritual level as well.

Mary had probably been actively engaged in the preparations for welcoming Jesus and the disciples, but once they arrived, Mary took off her apron and sat near Jesus to listen and take in everything he said. Mary had a thirst for Jesus' gospel message and Jesus would not let her be denied. Since Jesus knew he was heading to Jerusalem and crucifixion, he had a real sense of urgency about his spreading his

message about the kingdom of God and he wanted all to hear it, including Mary \underline{and} Martha.

For better or worse, we have a penchant for trying to force things into an either/or, black /white, yes/no paradigm, and we want to do the same thing with this narrative. If we look at things this way, either hospitality is what Jesus desires or Jesus wants us to attend to what he teaches. If we take a breath and step back from preconceived notions, we can see that hospitality or doing, and listening or receiving the Word, are both sides of the same coin: discipleship. Discipleship demands that we are steeped in Jesus' message so that we can translate that message into action that serves Jesus in the world.

Mary and Martha could very easily represent the dual nature of discipleship that needs to kept in balance to create unity of purpose within individuals and within faith communities. If we, like Martha, get so wrapped up in doing—projects, programs, logistical details, service opportunities, committee duties—that our actions become more like ticking off boxes on a to-do list than providing loving service in Jesus' name, we have lost sight of who and whose we are. On the other hand, if like Mary, we immerse ourselves in spiritual study to the point that the needs of the physical world become remote and unimportant, we have reduced the gospel to a mental activity and we lose sight of who it is our Savior came to save and who it is we are to serve in his name.

Each of us has special gifts and areas of expertise where we excel. Some of us are more comfortable being do-ers, and others of us are more comfortable with spirituality which is fine because we are the way God created us to be. However, to be mature, balanced disciples, we need to value and engage in spiritual development and then put our faith into action by serving others. The Mary and Martha within each of us and the Marys and Marthas within our congregation need each other, and best serve the Lord when they work in tandem to the glory of God.

Loving Lord, teach us to be mature disciples who rely on one another and work hand-in-hand to serve the world in your name and to your glory. Amen.

Registration

• Tuesday, July 19 from 6 - 8pm at The Uptown Ministry Center

Greeters(1-2): These folks will greet the kids and parents as they come for registration. Many of these families will be repeat and will know how the process works, but many will be here for the first time. It's important that the greeter is friendly and welcoming and brings in our families with love and grace.

As a greeter, you will simply bring them into the ministry center and show them where to go to the registration table.

Registration assistants (1-2): These folks will be handing clip boards and pencils to the guardian to fill out essential information about each child. You will need to make sure that the child they are registering is present with the parent. Make sure that the forms are legible and verifying information. You will then escort them to the foot measuring station.

Foot measurers (4-6): These folks will have Brannock devices to measure the child's foot and a partner to record the size on the form. Work in pairs to get the correct information quickly. After they are measured, take the form and family to the registration table to get their appointment for August 6.

Registration table (2): These folks will record the family information, issue the appointment sheet and answer any questions about the Event day.
