Devotional Meditation Elder Monica Stevens November 17, 2021

Therefore, as a prisoner for the Lord, I (Paul) encourage you to live as people worthy of the call you received from God. Conduct yourselves with all humility, gentleness, and patience. Accept each other with love, and make an effort to preserve the unity of the Spirit with the peace that ties you together. You are one body and one spirit, just as God also called you in one hope. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God and Father of all, who is over all, through all, and in all. God has given his grace to each one of us measured out by the gift that is given us by Christ...His purpose was to equip God's people for the work of serving and building up the body of Christ until we all reach the unity of faith and knowledge of God's Son. Ephesians 4:1-7, 12(CEB)

Have you ever heard the story of Stone Soup? Three travelers who had been walking a long way entered a town and hoped that they might be able to get something to eat and a place to rest. Unfortunately, whenever they asked any of the townspeople to help them, they were told that the crops had been poor that year and they had nothing to spare. Finally, one of the travelers said that in the face of the town's difficulties, they would teach the town to make Stone Soup so they wouldn't starve. What a miracle! Soup from stones! The travelers gathered up several large, round stones, washed them off and then asked for a fire to be built and a large kettle filled with water to be brought into the town square. When the water in the kettle was boiling, the stones were placed in the pot. One of the travelers sighed and said this soup was going to be good, but it would be so much better if it were seasoned with some salt and pepper. No sooner had they said it, than salt and pepper appeared from someone's pantry. The travelers did the same with carrots, and corn, potatoes, and a bit of meat. Each time people suddenly remembered that they did have a few things left in their larders and soon the vegetables and the meat appeared in the pot. Once the townspeople smelled the aroma of the simmering soup, they wanted to celebrate this miracle of soup from stones and they carried tables, benches, bowls, spoons, loaves of bread, butter, and cheese to the town square. What a night it was! Everyone ate until they were full and there was soup left over. The travelers spent the night comfortably in the homes of the townspeople, and the next day they continued on their journey with the blessings and good wishes of the grateful people.

the church—how to grow into being the body of Christ. Followers of Christ should relate to each other in humility, gentleness, patience, and love so that we may be bound to each other in unity. We have one Lord, one faith, and one baptism, and one God who rules over, through, and in all. But even though we share unity of spirit, God through Christ has given each of us different gifts. He doesn't want us to all serve in the same way, but each of us has been given gifts to use to serve God and build up the body of Christ. Some people have gifts that are readily on display such as leading, teaching, preaching, and pastoral care, but EVERYONE has gifts of one kind or another. These gifts can include: making contact with someone who has a need, or just someone you haven't seen in a while to encourage that person and let them know you were thinking about them; helping with the Community Breakfast and/or cooking treats or meals for those who might need them; using your hands to create something that would brighten the spirits of someone; using your hands to do handy work or yard work at the church or for someone who has a need; sharing in the work of various church committees; helping with worship activities such as recording the Sunday service or helping to light the Advent Wreath, taking the time to sit with or pray with someone in their hour of need. The list of ways to use our gifts is as varied and uplifting as the number of gifts we have been given.

In Ephesians 4, Paul was teaching Christians then and now how to live together as

We have each been given gifts to help us meet the various needs within our congregation and community. But sometimes we act more like the villagers at the beginning of our Stone Soup story. We often tend not to acknowledge our gifts, to keep them hidden and not use them. When we hide or deny our gifts, everyone, including ourselves, is poorer for it. When we choose not to share our gifts we begin to think negatively, dwelling on what we believe we can't do or don't have, and we draw into ourselves and away from others. This is a way of living that is quite the opposite of what Paul had in mind for the church.

If we use our gifts and share our gifts, remarkable things start to happen. When one person reaches out, another person is encouraged to do the same, then another, and another. Instead of believing that we have to hoard what we have because resources are scarce, we find that by sharing everyone has more than enough. We discover that while no one person has all the gifts, when we work together, each one doing what they do best, we learn to meet whatever needs arise. In our story, when no one shared, all were hungry, but when each one shared the little they had, all were fed. So it is with life lived in Christ Jesus. Thanks be to God.

Loving Father, you have blessed each one of us with gifts that will help to meet the needs of others. Fill our hearts with your love so that we may share our gifts with others and learn to live in the joy

that comes from serving you by serving others. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen

Empty corrugated pizza box acceptability in your area is implied since corrugated boxes are accepted and there's no mention of pizza boxes being prohibited.

SUGGESTION: To help clear the confusion, please contact your local recycling program and suggest they update the guideline to say, "Empty, corrugated pizza boxes are accepted, even if they have food residue on them. Please empty your corrugated pizza box and recycle it as you would any other corrugated box."
