Devotional Elder Monica Stevens October 6, 2021

## **Trust**

Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not rely on your own insight. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths. Proverbs 3:5-6

Tuesday we left the house just before six in the morning. It was still dark and overcast without any light from the moon or the stars to help guide us. Tendrils of fog could be seen floating in the air whenever we passed near a street lamp or other source of light. Visibility was decent as long as we were in town, but once we turned onto Highway 57 the fog thickened in front of us. Unless homes or businesses had electric lights, it was impossible to see anything other than the light on the fog in front of us and the stripes on the road. It was as if nothing existed outside the beams of the headlights. In many places the fog was so thick that it became a completely opaque wall and I had to rely on the few yards of stripes that I could see to be able to keep going. There was one short stretch of the road (maybe a hundred feet) where the stripes disappeared. It was disorienting and unnerving, and I was very relieved when the stripes returned.

That momentary feeling of helplessness made me realize I was entrusting my safety and forward progress to my belief that the stripes on the road would lead me in the right direction even when I couldn't really see where I was or where I was going. Every previous time I had taken that road, I had seen how accurately and effectively the stripes outlined the road. The DOT had painted those lines to specifically mark the safe boundaries of the road. The experiences I had had on sunny days told me that the stripes would be a reliable guide on that dark and foggy morning.

Most of the time, navigating through life is like driving on a dry, sunny day. We can clearly see where we are going, and we can see the landmarks and signs that tell us where to alter our course. A sunny day also makes it easier to see and react to potential hazards and surprises that might pop up. We feel confident in our ability

to get from point A to point B on our own without much difficulty, and in fact, the journey might even be an enjoyable experience. On days like that, we generally just hop in the car and go without giving it a whole lot of thought.

However, life isn't always clear and carefree, is it? Things happen that leave us disoriented, groping in the dark, frightened, lonely, and unsure about how to go on. Life can leave us searching for any glimmer of light, hope, and guidance as we try to make our way forward. As thankful as I was for the reassuring gift of the yellow and white stripes on the road this past Tuesday, I am infinitely more grateful to know and be known by God who created each of us, loves each of us, and cares for each of us. God is faithful and trustworthy in all things. God is always with us and we can rely on him in the daylight and in the deepest darkness. Meditate on these words from Psalm 139 and let them fill you with trust in our God.

Lord, you have examined me.

You know me.

You know when I sit down and when I stand up.

Even from far away, you comprehend my plans.

You study my traveling and resting.

You are thoroughly familiar with all of my ways.

There isn't a word on my tongue, Lord,

That you don't already know completely.

You surround me—front and back.

You put your hand on me.

That kind of knowledge is too much for me;

It's so high that I can't reach it.

Where could I go to get away from your spirit?
Where could I go to escape your presence?
If I went up to heaven, you would be there.
If I went down to the grave, you would be there too!
If I could fly on the wings of the dawn,
Stopping to rest only on the far side of the ocean—
Even there your hand would guide me;
Even there your strong hand would hold me tight!
If I said, "The darkness will definitely hide me;
The light will become night around me,"
Even then the darkness isn't too dark for you!
Nighttime would shine bright as day,
Because darkness is the same as light to you!

You are the one who created my innermost parts;
You knit me together while I was still in my mother's womb.
I give thanks to you that I was marvelously set apart.
Your works are wonderful—I know that very well.

My bones weren't hidden from you

When I was being out together in the secret place,

when I was being woven together in the deep parts of the earth.

Your eyes saw my embryo,

And on your scroll every day was written that was being formed for me,

## **From the Transition Team**

When Pastor Mark retired on August 31, our church began the process of finding a new pastor. A Transition Team, made up of Monica Stevens, Denny Casey, and Joan Montgomery was appointed by the Session's Administration Committee. In an effort to keep the congregation informed we want to tell you the work that has been done and the work to be done.

- The Transition Team met with Carl Utley, our General Presbyter, on 9/16/21 for training.
- Responsibilities of the Transition Team are:
- 1. Identify and recommend to Session a candidate for Interim Pastor;
- 2. Identify Transitional Priorities for Interim start up;
- 3. Consult staff and elders about needs from Interim Pastor;
- 4. Complete the Presbytery's Ministry Information Form (MIF) and seek appropriate approvals. The MIF describes our church in location, membership, mission statement, narrative questions, and top 10 Leadership Competencies, salary range, and basically what we are looking for in an Interim Pastor;
- 5. Work with the Interim during transition as requested by Interim; and
- 6. Communicate to congregation about transitional process.
- We were charged with interviewing staff and session members for what they wanted professionally and personally in an Interim Pastor. That has been completed.
- The Transition team met on 9/28/21 to consolidate the interview responses and to begin completing the MIF.
- The goal is to present the MIF to Session at the October meeting for approval.
- Upon approval by the Session, the Committee on Ministry, and the Presbytery, the MIF will be submitted to the Presbytery.
- Candidates will be identified based on matching our needs with candidate applications and the Transition Team can then begin interviewing.
- The goal is to find an Interim by the end of 2021.

# **Earth Care**

When autumn arrives, we all like to admire the fall foliage. But it can be hard for homeowners to love fall leaves when they drop off of tree limbs and onto green lawns. And in a number of communities, the once-accepted methods of getting rid of leaves—chucking them into the trash can or lighting large piles on fire—are no longer allowed, due to

limits on landfill space and concerns over human health. So what are some good earth-friendly options for autumn's fallen leaves? Here are four tips to help you get rid of your leaves while reducing your impact on the earth.

## Mulch them

Leave the rake in the shed and the leaf-blower at the hardware store—mulching allows you to get rid of leaves without having to wrestle them into precarious piles first! Just run over fallen leaves with a lawn mower, mulching blade attached. The blade will cut the leaves into small pieces, which will settle undetected beneath the green canopy of your lawn. A long-term study of leaf-mulching confirmed the practice even benefits your backyard, as the leaves feed the underground microbes that benefit soil health.

#### **Compost them**

Fallen leaves are critical to composting. Leaves, twigs and other carbon-rich "brown" plant material can be added to existing compost piles to bring balance to nitrogen-rich lawn clippings, fruit and vegetable waste and other "green" plant material. Or, large piles of leaves can be composted on their own. If kept moist and periodically turned, the leaves will decompose and create a dark, crumbly compost that can enrich the soil in your garden.

#### Paper bag them

If putting fallen leaves to use in your lawn or garden just isn't an option, then consider curbside collection. A number of local governments collect leaves each fall, whether they are raked in piles to the curb or placed in paper bags. Even garbage-collection services often offer yard waste pick-up, transporting leaves to municipal composting facilities to keep them out of landfills.

#### Don't burn them

A lit match is a tempting solution to the leaf pile problem, but burning leaves can pollute the air and harm our health. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the open burning of leaves puts particulate matter and hydrocarbons into the

air. The former can increase your chances of respiratory infection, while the latter contains toxic and cancer-causing compounds.
