Week of September 12, 2021

"...Be strong and courageous; do not be frightened or dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go." Joshua 1:9

I was having a conversation with a friend the other day about 9/11. He asked me, "Do you remember what you were doing when you heard the news?" "I do" I said, and my mind wandered back to that morning twenty years ago. My memories, as I'm sure many others', are still strong, as if indelibly etched in our collective memory. And even some of the same feelings I experienced at the time, seemed to bubble to the surface as we talked. Shock. Disorientation. Helplessness. Profound sadness.

What do you remember?

I remember being at work and someone came through the building announcing that a plane had crashed into the World Trade Center. It must have been minutes after the first plane hit. She said they had set up a TV in another office and if anyone wanted to watch to come over. Back then, we didn't have many TVs, the internet was just in its adolescence, and cell phones weren't nearly as 'smart' as they are now. So, a handful of us we gathered around a small TV set in a small office and watched, mesmerized in silence and in utter dismay at what we were witnessing. That morning, we all shared an experience of epic proportion and in the days that followed we learned more about what had happened and questions began to naturally arise. How could this have happened? How do we make sense of this? How are we to respond to this? What will life be like tomorrow? Is there more to come?

Which leads me to the Bible passage from the first chapter of Joshua. When Moses had died, God spoke to his assistant Joshua, calling him to complete the long and arduous trek through the wilderness the Israelites had been on for forty years. They were just to the east of the Jordan River and before them was the Land of Canaan,

the land God had promised them. But first they were commanded to arise and cross over the Jordan. The Israelites were faithful but didn't know what lie ahead. They didn't know what foes they were to face. They didn't know if they would live or die. They didn't know if they were going to reach the Promised Land. They must have had lots of questions. They must have felt anxiety and uncertainty about what lie ahead.

And I think about all that we're faced with today...the pandemic, climate change, natural disasters, racial and economic inequities, political division, and global human rights issues. We have much to feel uncertain and helpless about. But, like Joshua, I think we are being called to put our faith in the Lord and to lead with assurance on God's path. What God said to Joshua - that He will be with him in what lies ahead and that he should not be frightened, can also give us great comfort, strength, and encouragement. Think of it, wherever we go, whatever happens, God will be with us. What a blessed assurance that is! But for Joshua and the Israelites that was just the beginning. They had a lot of work to do once they crossed the Jordan. We have work to do too.

The first thing we can do is to draw closer to God...to pray and to put our faith fully in the Lord. And when we do, we will be compelled to put our faith into action. As James calls us: faith without action is dead. We can easily succumb to feelings of helplessness or be tempted to place blame or to pursue political partisanship or spread mistrust, hatred, and intolerance. But we are called to a higher purpose and to put our faith into action, as Micah calls us: to do justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with our God. The scope of our challenges might seem overwhelming, but there's always something we can do, no matter how small it might seem. Every faithful act truly does matter. Like a pebble dropped onto a pond, what we do can send ripples of lasting and far-reaching effects.

What if we get together for a time of prayer? What if we ask for God's wisdom with our challenges? What if we take more time to share the love of Christ with others? We can support victims of disasters. We can express our appreciation and honor those who work to help us during crises such as first-responders, people in health care, spiritual leaders, counselors, and those who help with crisis management. We can seek and support partnerships with secular and interfaith organizations that are dedicated to working for peace and justice. Not sure where to start? Let's go to the Lord in prayer.


