Pastor's Corner

Doing the Lord's Business

May the God of peace himself sanctify you wholly; and may your spirit, soul, and body be kept sound and blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. He who calls you is faithful in His promises. I Thessalonians 5:23-24

There is a story told of a parson who was visited by an anxious parishioner, shouting, "Jesus is coming! Jesus is coming! What should we do? What should we do?" Calmly, the parson replied, "Look busy, look busy." Although the returning or coming of the Lord is certainly the main thrust of this passage in I Thessalonians, the parson's response really misses the mark. While "busyness" is the order of the day for those awaiting the return of Christ, it's not "looking busy" but the activity itself. More aptly, it's doing the Lord's "busyness," not business as usual.

But what does "busy for the Lord" include? Anticipating Christ's return, among such "busyness," Paul tells his Thessalonian readers in verses 12-22 to get their lives in order, "Be at peace yourselves, admonish the idlers, encourage the faint hearted, help the weak, be patient with all of them. See that none of you repay evil for evil, but always seek to do good to one another and to all. Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, and give thanks in all situations; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. Do not quench the Spirit; do not despise the work of the prophets but test everything; hold fast to what is good; abstain from every form of evil."

If we as Christians would follow such directions we would not only look busy but would actually be busy! We could be busy doing "the work of the church" rather than convincing ourselves that by doing "church work" we must be doing God's will! In the beginning of this new calendar year, make it your "business" to be "busy for the Lord" for the rest of your years!

always the Sunday on or preceding February 8th. The Saturday following February 8th is Scout Sabbath. This year Scout Sunday falls on the actual 105th Anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America.
