From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

# I'm in the midst of Holy Week and I am working on two devotionals for our Good Friday worship service here at noon, a devotional to be given at the Agape Bible Christian Fellowship that Good Friday evening, and my sermon for Easter. As I thought about what to write for this column in our May 2011 *Steepleviews* newsletter, I remembered a story that I used years ago in another Easter sermon. Granted, the story is from another era but the point it makes is eternal.

Margaret Slattery told this true story about a family she knew. That family lost three children in less than a week by diphtheria. Only the little three-year-old escaped death. When Easter came the parents and their remaining child were at church. The mother taught her class of girls that day in Sunday School; the father went to the S. S. superintendent's desk, led his school in worship, and read the Easter story with only a break now and then in his fine voice. Amid the faces lined by suffering, rebellion and despair, amid the badges of sorrow and mourning and the silent voices of the Easter congregation, they had seemed a miracle. "How can they?" men and women said to each other as they left the church. A fifteen-year-old boy walking home with his father from the Sunday School hour said hesitatingly, for he did not talk much with his father, "Dad, I guess Mr. and Mrs. Jones really believe it, don't they?" "Believe what?" the father asked. "The whole big thing, all of it, Easter, you know." "O course," answered the father, "all Christians believe it." "Not that way," said the boy, and he began to whistle lest his father should say more.

Again, that story is dated, and yet, the message contained within the story is powerfully true in every age. By the grace of God, we can believe "the whole big thing, all of it, Easter." It doesn't make sense; it's not logical; it is hard to grasp. And yet, by grace and faith and scripture alone we believe that God raised the crucified Jesus from death and he arose in triumph over the enemies, sin and death. While we can't explain the resurrection, we have certainly learned from the biblical record and have experienced it in our own lives that with God all things are possible!

That's what caught the fifteen-year-old boy's attention. There was something different about Mr. and Mrs. Jones because they not only believed the Good News of the Gospel, they lived it! Even in the midst of their deep sorrow after the death of three of their children, they were sustained and comforted by their belief that, because Christ lives, their children live as well in the eternal kingdom of God; and, by that same grace, they would be reunited with their loved ones beyond the grave.

We are mistaken, however, if we think of Jesus' resurrection and focus solely on its eternal benefits beyond death. Jesus' resurrection enables us to come alive here and now. Instead of simply existing and going through the motions day after day as we await death, "the whole big thing of Easter" empowers us to experience the new, abundant, and eternal life that Christ Jesus offers us today. By God's grace, we are Easter people. And, we are called to live, really live (like Mr. and Mrs. Jones!), the resurrected life even now as we await the life to come. Thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our risen Lord Jesus Christ!
