From My Perspective Within The Kingdom

I just finished writing my sermon for November 20th and I still have Jesus' words ringing in my ears: "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me" (Matthew 25:40). The next task on my "to do" list is to write my article for the December 2011 *Steepleviews* newsletter.

Jesus' words make me think of the lovely story (*The Other Wise Man*) that Henry Van Dyke wrote. He tells about a fourth Magi, Artaban, who intended to join the other wise men to travel to Bethlehem, following the star. He sold all of his possessions in order to purchase a sapphire, a ruby, and a pearl to give to the newborn King. As Artaban hurried to meet up with the other wise men, he came across a man who was stranded and sick with fever. He could not abandon the stranger, so Artaban stopped and nursed the man until he was well.

However, that act of kindness cost him for he arrived to find that the other three Magi had left without him. Artaban was forced to sell his ruby to hire a caravan to carry him to Bethlehem. It grieved him to part with one of the gifts he wanted to give to the King, but he had no choice.

Artaban finally arrived in Bethlehem but, once again, he was too late for Joseph and Mary had fled to Egypt with the Holy Child. Herod's soldiers came that same night. To save the newborn child of the family with whom he was staying, Artaban bribed Herod's captain with the sapphire so that he would not enter their home. The child lived, but the sapphire was gone.

For more than thirty years Artaban wandered throughout the countryside seeking the King of kings, but he always arrived too late. Even so, Artaban never gave up hope. Nor did he ever cease to respond to others in need, often giving help he could scarcely afford. When his wealth gave out, he worked as a common laborer. Yet he never sold the pearl.

Artaban was in Jerusalem when he learned that the man Jesus, who was said to be the King of the Jews, was going to be crucified. Artaban hurried to Golgotha hoping to offer the pearl for the life of the King. On the way, he saw a woman, who begged for his help. Her father was deep in debt and she was to be sold into slavery to pay his creditors off. Artaban gave his last treasure to the creditors in order to set the woman free. Then, he sat down and wept bitterly for he had nothing left to give to the King.

Suddenly, the sky turned dark as night and a great earthquake shook the ground. A heavy tile fell from a rooftop and struck Artaban, and, as he lay dying, those nearby heard him say, "Oh my Lord, my Lord, how often have I failed Thee?" Then a bright radiance gathered around him and the people heard another Voice softly answer, "Oh, no, my good and faithful child. From the beginning you have given to the least of these, my beloved, and, in so doing, you have given to me."

As we give to others, we know the joy of giving to the Christ. In the month ahead, we have numerous opportunities to give to the least of these in the way of Christmas Cheer, the Angel Tree, the Joy Gift special offering, Christmas Share as well as giving of ourselves through our presence at the children's Christmas play on December 4 and the Chancel Choir's Christmas program on December 18. Since God so loved the world that God gave the only Son, in Jesus' name, let us gladly give of ourselves to each other and to all the others God will send our way during the Advent and Christmas season.

May you and yours have a blessed and joyous Christmas!
