

## From the Associate Pastor...

I was out running several errands on the morning of Friday, December 14th, picking up last minute items to prepare for the baby. It was two days after my due date, and I was feeling increasingly tired, both physically and mentally, of waiting for the big arrival. Before heading home, I paused to check my phone, and first saw the news of the tragic school shooting in Newtown, Connecticut. I broke down in tears in the parking lot; my heart broken for the families grieving, my mind overwhelmed by the violence and evil that plagues our world – targeting even the most innocent. Suddenly, I didn't mind so much that my baby's arrival was delayed, I felt she was safer right where she was.

In the days that followed I remembered a sermon that gifted preacher Tom Troeger had given at Montreat a couple summers before. He told of a day, during the season of Advent, when he opened the newspaper to read of a local family murdered, heard on television of another shooting, and finally broke down when he read his email to find that a friend's brother had been found dead in his office. Overwhelmed with the vulnerability of human life, he said in that moment he thought, "O Lord, do not become flesh, do not be born of Mary, do not send the angels to the shepherds, do not lay the little child in the manger. If you come and dwell among us, we'll just kill you."

The violence in Newtown shattered the illusion that we sometimes imagine for ourselves at Christmastime. We envision a silent night, a peaceful harmony of mother and child. We work hard to get in the "Christmas spirit" with festive decorations and celebrations. Sometimes we can forget that the moment of Christ's incarnation is incredibly vulnerable, terrifying and risky. But this is exactly the good news: that God came to dwell among us in the person of Jesus Christ. Jesus lived and shared God's justice and peace with the last and the least, he faced violence and death, and by his resurrection exposed that sin's power over us is not as strong as God's love.

Tom Troeger wrote lyrics to an anthem text, *The Dream Isaiah Saw*, in response to the events of that Advent day. He draws on the imagery of Isaiah's peaceable kingdom, *Lions and oxen will sleep in the hay, leopards will join with the lambs as they play, Wolves will be pastured with cows in the glade, blood will not darken the Earth that God made. Little child whose bed is straw, take new lodgings in my heart. Bring the dream Isaiah saw: knowledge, wisdom, worship, awe.* 

Let us live and embody Isaiah's dream, as Jesus showed us in his life and ministry. Let us follow as this little child leads us: risking vulnerability to the powers of our world, sharing peace in the face of violence, and living hope in the midst of despair.

#### YOU CAN GIVE TWO CENTS A MEAL!!!

Two Cents-a-Meal invites every member of our congregation to prayerfully contribute a few cents at each meal to help alleviate hunger and poverty. Ideally, contributions come from "living more simply so that others may simply live." Participation in Two Cents-a-Meal is also a commitment to share with others in response to Jesus' command, "You give them something to eat."

What is Two Cents-a-meal?

The Two Cents-a-Meal concept originated with Presbyterian women to provide an oppor-

tunity for individuals and families to participate in a corporate response to world hunger. The Presbyterian Women's Birthday Offering funded a



hunger program that started the Hunger Action Enabler network in 1973.

In November 1975, Florida resident Rosellyn Calvert, whose own family was struggling financially, asked God what she could do to help those suffering from hunger and poverty around the world. She was led to give just two cents a meal. The Calvert family committed to each give two cents, and in April of 1976 Rosellyn shared the concept with her presbytery. Today, most presbyteries encourage the contribution of two cents (or more) per person at each meal, reminding individuals, families and groups each time they eat of the needs of others and our call to respond as Christians to their hunger. Daily participation is a reminder of the reality of hunger for millions of our sisters and brothers in the world. As the money accumulates, those participating become aware that small, regular acts can result in significant responses to hunger and that there is great strength in working together with other Christians.

It is suggested that families have a special container nearby and place offerings in it at each meal. Children in your family may make a special container or a simple box or jar may be used. The <u>fourth Sunday of each month</u> and special events have been designated as a time to receive your offerings.

### Montreat Youth Conference 2013 "Here and Be Heard"

All youth from rising 9th graders through graduated seniors are invited to come along with our group to the Montreat Youth Conference from July 24-30. The theme for this year's conference is Here and Be Heard. A Youth Conference is a unique gathering of young people from all over the country for a week of study, worship, and recreation. Activities include morning energizers, music, keynote, small group meetings where the conference then is explored, afternoon recreation activities, and evening worship. Our group will be staying together in a rental cottage as in years past. Information forms have been sent out by mail, and are available on the bulletin board downstairs near the youth room. There is presently waiting list. The total cost for church members is \$250, and for non-church members is \$300. The remainder of the cost is due on March 1. # Shawl Dedication Sunday, was held January 27

Twelve new prayer shawls were dedicated during the January 27, (11:00am) worship service.. The Prayer Shawl Ministry began in September

2012 and now involves 17 knitters. Knitters pray for the recipients as they knit and the shawls are then presented during a church service, giving the congregation of our church the opportunity to be a part of this ministry. Prayer shawls are delivered to the sick, the bereaved, or to celebrate a special occasion. A card is attached to each shawl that reads: This shawl was knitted for you by a member of the congregation of First Presbyterian Church. shawl represents the love we have for you and the hope it offers. We ask that you wrap it around you knowing that the congregation prayed for you and dedicated this shawl as a symbol of God's love. The Prayer Shawl Ministry of First Presbyterian Church, Martinsville.

The Prayer Shaw Ministry hopes you were present for this meaningful service. After the dedication, prayer shawls are housed in the pastor's closet and may be given to anyone in or outside of the congregation who is in need of knowing God's love and the love of First Presbyterian Church. Make sure the shawl is signed out so we might know who took a shawl and who received one. Sixteen prayer shawls have already been delivered from our congregation.
